Town of Neversink SPRING CLEANUP 2019

Spring Cleanup will be held on April 27, May 1, 4 & 8, 2019. The Transfer Station will be open during normal business hours. Residents with Purple 2019 permits will be allowed 2 loads which must be brought during the Spring Cleanup dates. Permit cards will be punched for each load.

TVs and other electronic items can be disposed of with payment being made by SW coupons. Refrigerators, freezers, dehumidifiers and air conditioners require a Freon removal fee of \$15.00 per item. Each permit holder is entitled to four free car tires. Scrap metal can be taken anytime throughout the year without charge. Due to the high volume of traffic during spring cleanup, residents are asked NOT TO bring any of these items during Spring Cleanup. Please bring these items at a later date.

The Town of Neversink Transfer Station is open only to those persons who have their household and generate their waste material in the Town of Neversink. Ownership of vacant land does not qualify for use of the facility. Municipal Cleanup Initiative Program is made possible by the Sullivan County Legislature.

Nature Column - Linda Comando

A tribute to the memory of all of the Townsman Ladies that we have lost and loved so much... Peggy DeWire, Avril Pappa, Joan Hall, Polly Hill, Joyce Lockhart, Jean Helthaler, Karen Curry and Barbara Slater.

Last week as we were out-and-about, we saw a beautiful Red-tailed Hawk fly over and land on a wire alongside of the highway which prompted us to watch the skies in Sundown. Sure enough, this past weekend we watched while a pair of Red-tailed Hawks flew overhead. We watched for a while as they made wide spirals about 1,500 to 2,000 feet above us. Eventually the pair descended low enough that we could see they were about 20 inches long



with wingspans of 40 to 50 inches. We could see their light-colored breasts speckled speckled with dark spots and their red tail feath-Red-tailed Hawks are large, stocky birds that will live in forests near open country.

Their nests are usually built near the edge of a stream,

lake, or field.

The Red-tailed Hawk, one of North America's most widespread and common hawks, has excellent eyesight and can spot a mouse from a height of 100 feet.

They will also hunt from perches, usually alongside a field. Most of their prey is small mammals, including: mice, voles, shrews, moles, squirrels, chipmunks, rats, rabbits, opossum. Although they eat mostly mammals, there is a great variety of other animals Red-tailed Hawks will prey upon, including: snakes, turtles, frogs, lizards, salamanders, toads, ducks, bobwhite, crows, woodpeckers, starlings, doves, Red-winged Blackbirds, kingfishers, robins, owls, other birds, crayfish, centipedes, spiders, grasshoppers, crickets, beetles, earthworms, and fish. Red-tailed hawks swallow smaller prey whole while larger prey are killed with talons, and then pulled into pieces with the hawk's sharp, hooked beak.

Red-tailed Hawks throw up pellets. When they swallow prey whole, they regurgitate (throw up) small balls of hair, feathers, and bone.

Red-tailed Hawks will steal from other raptors, such as eagles, owls, or other hawks. Mated Red-tailed Hawks will sometimes work together while hunting. An example might be chasing a squirrel around a tree until one of the hawks can catch it.

Red-tailed Hawks will also eat road kill and other carrion (previously dead, but fairly fresh animals) muskrats, cats, skunks, and bats.

Red-tailed Hawks mate in the spring when they perform a sort of courtship "dance" where the male and female dive and roll in the sky. They will even lock talons (sharp toes) and fall together awhile before splitting apart. Red-tailed hawks breed for life, although a partner is soon replaced if it dies.

Both adults cooperate to build a nest in the crown of a tall tree such as an oak or pine, or a rock ledge, which gives them a commanding view of the landscape. Pairs may also simply repair a nest used during previous seasons. The nest is a tall pile of dry sticks, with the inner layer lined with bark strips, fresh foliage, and dry vegetation.

Nests are built with sticks and lined with twigs, bark shreds, pine needles, and green plant material. The female hawk lays two or three white eggs with brown spots that are incubated for 28 to 35 days. While the female warms the eggs the male hunts and feeds her. The chicks fledge at 42 to 48 days, but stay with the adults for a further 30 to 70 days before becoming fully independent.

Once they leave the nest, the youngsters hop around a lot on the ground, looking for small prey such as insects and spiders. When they have perfected flying, they will begin to hunt larger prey from the air.

Most red-tailed hawks first breed at two years of age.

Also known as a Chicken Hawk, Red-tailed Hawks are very territorial. They will chase other Red-tailed Hawks and birds larger than them that get too close. Predators of Red-tailed Hawks include Raccoons, Great Horned Owls, and Red Fox. Red-tailed Hawks can live up to 15 years in

Whenever you hear a raptor call on a TV commercial or in a movie, it is most likely a Red-tailed Hawk's call.

Sullivan County Planning for Measles Prevention, Education, and Clinics

Liberty, NY - In light of the ongoing measles outbreaks in New York City and Rockland County, Sullivan County is preparing for the summer months when there is a large influx of visitors and second home-owners.

As of April 11, there are 180 confirmed reported cases of measles in Rockland County. In New York City, there have been 285 confirmed cases since the outbreak began in October 2018; 21 of those cases led to hospitalizations.

Measles is extremely contagious, and about 90% of unvaccinated people exposed to the virus will become infected.

Sullivan County Public Health Services staff have been meeting with area healthcare providers, school officials, first responders and hospital staff to discuss preparations to limit the spread of measles in the coming months.

"The single most important thing we can all do to protect the community is to remain up-to-date with measles vaccination, ensure that summer camps, day cares, and schools abide by immunization requirements, and that our healthcare providers are prepared to isolate any ill patients quickly with proper infection control policies and procedures," said Public Health Director Nancy McGraw. "A larger meeting with community leaders and healthcare providers will be held later this month."

Two confirmed cases in Sullivan County were reported March 14, and since then, Public Health staff have been conducting investigations on several additional residents who were exposed to individuals from NYC who were positive for measles. These individuals are being monitored for symptoms.

"We ask that if you become ill with a fever, rash, or conjunctivitis (red watery eyes), help protect our community by staying home, not having visitors, and not going out in public," McGraw added. "To further prevent the spread of illness, the Department is advising individuals who have symptoms consistent with measles to contact their healthcare provider, a local clinic, or a local emergency department before going for care. This will help to prevent others at these facilities from being exposed to the illness."

In particular, Sullivan County Public Health Services strongly recommends that summer camp owners and directors, visitors, parents and guardians review the vaccination status of campers, employees and children.

The single best way to prevent measles is to be vaccinated. Individuals should receive 2 doses of MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella) vaccine to be protected. If a person is unsure if they are immune, they should contact their healthcare provider. The first dose should be given at 12-15 months of age and the second dose at 4 to 6 years of age (age of school entry).

In New York State, measles immunization is required of children enrolled in schools, daycare, and pre-kindergarten. Since August 1990, college students have also been

required to demonstrate immunity against measles. If your family is traveling overseas, the vaccine recommendations are a little different, and you should discuss with your health care provider or visitwww.cdc.gov/measles/about/parents-top4.html

"We have reinforced the importance for all healthcare providers to immediately report all cases of suspect measles to the Sullivan County Public Health Communicable Disease Program staff by calling (845) 292-5910 during normal business hours and after hours/weekends," said McGraw.

Sullivan County Public Health Services offers free vaccine clinics for children who are uninsured or have Medicaid on the second Wednesday each month from 5-7 p.m. at 50 Community Lane, Gladys Olmsted Building, Liberty. No appointment is necessary.

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

Tonight is a rare pink glowing moon that will fall on a blue moon, the second full moon that falls in one month. It is also Passover and Easter celebrations. As I dressed this morning in my jeans and tee shirt, I thought back to my child-hood celebrations

As a child, I remember getting three new outfits a year. I must have gotten others because I never recall being naked, but we only shopped for going-back-to-school outfit, a Christmas outfit and an Easter outfit. The Easter outfit was the best because it was ACCESSORIZED. No dress was complete without a Fleece Topper, white cotton gloves, white ankle socks and black patent Mary Jane shoes.

We would always go to church and then to my Norwegian grandparents for the day. We would bring a hyacinth plant to my Nana who always said, "Bring me flowers while I can smell them." Each year now I buy hyacinth plants and plant them in a garden after they have bloomed, and each spring I am treated to a few dozen, mostly purple, fragrant plants to remind me of the message of rebirth and resurrection.

I also remember dying eggs with my family. There were multi-colored eggs for the Easter Egg basket and solid red ones (red for the blood of Christ) to be used in the Greek Easter Egg contest where the person won If their egg didn't crack when bonked against another person's red egg. I still dye eggs even though my children are pushing middle age. The week after Easter we have an abundance of egg salad and deviled egg dishes.

I also love watching my granddaughter at the Bushkill Rod and Gun Club Easter egg hunt. Turning nine, this may be the last one we go to. I am not sure how coloring eggs to go into an Easter basket, a reminder of the pagan fertility of the earth, got made into chocolate bunnies and jelly beans, but even my twenty-something granddaughter looks forward to her basket of candy treats.

Nowadays the Easter menu is an eclectic blend of all the nationalities of a fourth generation family of Italian, Polish, Danish, French, Greek, Norwegian, English, and Argentine heritage. The traditional ham dinner is enhanced with lamb, bread with red-dyed eggs, Avelegmono (egg and lemon soup), lasagne, flan, glumpkies, pirogies and kielbasa. It is a veritable feast of culinary delights usually served in a United Nations potluck buffet.

Last year I had mentioned to Tim Cox, our local Town Justice, that I had never been to one, and this year he remembered to invite me to his family's tradition. 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




