4H Puppy Pals Volunteer at Grahamsville Post Office






7th grade LEARN winner Amelia Mickelson and 8th grade LEARN winner Gavin Clarke with all past winners LEARN winners in grades 7-12

_DEC Announces Progress in Efforts to Eradicate Dangerous and Invasive Giant Hogweed

Public Reminded to Report Giant Hogweed Locations, Especially as Plants Begin Blooming New York State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Basil Seggos announced that statewide efforts to control giant hogweed are making substantial headway in eradicating this large, invasive, and dangerous plant. The Giant Hogweed Program, managed by DEC's Division of Lands and Forests, is in its twelfth year and has eradicated the plants from 623 sites, with another 448 plant-free sites being mon-



"With the assistance of our local partners, DEC's Giant Hogweed Program has made excellent progress in removing this dangerous invasive from New York communities,' said Commissioner Seggos. "DEC not only works to eradicate this health hazard, but also to raise public awareness about how to recognize it, avoid it, and report it. We urge New Yorkers to stay vigilant and report potential giant hogweed to DEC, especially during the next few weeks as the plants begin to bloom and become more noticeable.

Giant hogweed can cause severe skin and eye irritation, including painful burns and scarring when skin exposed to its sap becomes more sensitive to UV radiation. As a noxious weed, is unlawful to propagate, sell, or transport. In addition to health concerns, giant hogweed negatively impacts the state's ecosystem by crowding out native plants and contributing to soil erosion.

Over the years, the diligence of DEC and its regional and municipal partners has led to the confirmation of 2,484 giant hogweed sites in 51 counties. The majority of active sites are concentrated in Central and Western New York. With landowner permission, crews visit and remove these invasive plants using root-cutting, herbicide, and umbel (flower head) removal control methods.

DEC today released a 2018 Annual Report, which details the progress being made to identify giant hogweed and eradicate this noxious weed. During the 2018 season:

- Crews visited 1,993 sites to survey for or control giant
- No plants were found for the third consecutive year at 118 sites, bringing the total number of eradicated sites to 623 an increase of 25 percent from 2017;
- Of all sites previously treated for infestation, 43 percent (1,071 sites) had no plants in 2018;
- Crews removed approximately 678,000 plants from 1,271 sites during the 2018 field season;
- Stream surveys were conducted for the first time last year. Crews searched upstream for additional infestations that may have contributed to known giant hogweed locations from seeds being carried downstream. A two-person crew visited 317 stream-side properties, surveyed 37.6 miles of stream frontage, and found 76 new infestations; (Contd. Pg. 4)

Red Metal opens in Kenya, where the Russians are mining a mountain of precious, rare earth minerals; a necessity in manufacturing everything hightech, from satellites to cell phones, under an agreement with the government. It's a treaty signed in greed and ignorance, that hugely favors the Russians, and the Kenyans, with assistance from the United States, kick the Russians out by force...humiliating a Spetsnatz (Special Forces) Colonel named Yuri Borbikov in the process. DEC Announces Progress in Efforts to Eradicate Dangerous and Invasive Giant Hogweed

(From Pg. 3) • Of the sites statewide that still had plants, 71 percent (1,005) had less than 100 plants and are considered small sites that can be eradicated relatively quickly. DEC expects many more of these sites to have no new plants in the next few years; and

• Larger sites are responding well to control. Many larger sites that required herbicide treatment are now small enough to be treated by root cutting. Fewer sites have large flowering plants and, in general, sites are patchier than in previous years

In addition to working with regional and municipal partners, the public has been an invaluable partner in DEC's Giant Hogweed Program, by submitting about 2,000 location reports via phone calls and e-mails each year. Giant hogweed is currently flowering, making this one of the easiest times of the year to locate the plant. Flowering giant hogweed are eight to 14 feet tall and have large, flat-topped clusters of small white flowers, a green stem with purple blotches and coarse white hairs, and large leaves up to five feet across.

If a member of the public finds giant hogweed, please do not touch the plant, take photos of the entire plant (stem, leaves, flower, seeds), note the location, and send a report with the information via email to ghogweed@dec.ny.gov, text to 518-320-0309, or call the Information Line at 845-256-3111. If confirmed, DEC will contact the landowner to discuss control options. To report and learn more about other invasive species, the public can use the iMapInvasivesdatabase and mapping tool that helps share and coordinate information about detections and response efforts.

New York State is taking a comprehensive approach to reduce the negative impacts of invasive species through control or removal activities, research, and spread prevention. Recently, Governor Cuomo announced more than \$2.8 million in grants to DEC's partners across the state for a variety of projects to address invasive species, including giant hogweed. From July 7-13, 2019, New York State will hold Invasive Species Awareness Week featuring statewide events that encourage New Yorkers to help protect the state's resources from the negative impacts of invasive species.

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

The MAX project, focused on the opiate use epidemic, changes the process of how Emergency Department (ED) providers and staff manage care for patients who present to the ED repeatedly seeking opioid treatment for chronic

pain management. The initiative has produced impactful results. There has been an 84% reduction in ED visits by the patients followed, with a 97% reduction in the administration of opioids to these patients.

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





Award Winning Opto-Mechanical Engineer Lester Cohen Elected to FCSD Hall of Fame



A graduate of Fallsburg Central High School in 1968, Lester Cohen received a B.S. and M.S, in Civil Engineering at Boston's Northeastern University. In 1978, he began a more than forty-year career at The Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory, which together with Harvard University make up the Center for Astrophysics. He became the Chief Engineer of the Structural Analysis & Design Group. His work on two of NASA's great observatories-the Chandra X-ray Observatory and the James Webb Space Telescope, to be launched in 2021-earned Lester Cohen the 2009 NASA Distinguished Public Service Medal and numerous recognition awards.

He is proud that he shares the same award as Carl Sagan and Neil deGrasse Tyson. Lester's colleagues at NASA acknowledge that his technical brilliance and integrity are unrivaled. He has distinguished himself as a top mechanical engineer in the development of space telescopes. He has been described as a technical wizard. So when I found out I had sprained my knee, I did what anyone would do....slapped on the knee brace, grabbed a cane and took off for Woodstock. There I met up with best friend Felicia Raphael, founder of Second Time Around Sanctuary and renown Jazz bassist Don Miller. Second Time Around takes in elderly pets and pets with physical problems that have been dumped in shelters and are deemed unadoptable.



There's a wonderful new 'hot spot' in Woodstock called simply STATION. This is where we met to hear the PETER EINHORN QUARTET. This afternoon transported me back to my years in Chicago when Sunday afternoons were to head to the near north side. Now granted, New York Jazz differs from Chicago Jazz but Jazz per se is the one thing that unites all musicians. CHARLES FROMMER (featured musician at the SPEAKEASY JAZZ SERIES) on sax, PETER EINHORN on his pristine 1953 Gibson ES175 guitar (he has played with the likes of Placido Domingo and everywhere from the NYC Jazz clubs to the Metropolitan Opera), PETER O'BRIEN (The Edgar Winter Band, Buddy Guy and Orleans among others) on drums, and the great LOU PAPPAS (retired adjunct faculty, double bass studies at NY University; who's name shows up with every Jazz great in upstate NY) on upright bass. And there was I, watching this gathering of monster and revered musicians with their peer, Don Miller who sat in for one set, in a simple outdoor setting. Magical!!!



Also magical was THE JOHNNY JULES BAND at the Sullivan County Historical Society and Museum in Hurleyville this past Sunday. I drove the block from my house (for obvious reasons) and had to do a loop twice to find a parking space! In the photo of the crowd, do you see those two specks in front with guitars? That's LITTLE SPARROW who hosts these Sunday afternoons. I can honestly say, this was as large a crowd as I saw with Slam Allen! What was even more impressive was that the band, Johnny on guitar and vocals, Dave D'Arcy on bass and vocals, and Bobby D on Dobro, held this audience. It could not have been more of a concert setting with all persons held rapt in their seats. As Johnny said, "Woodstock was not about a concert, it was a way of life." The quick little stories about the iconic HECTOR'S, attempts of the County to thwart any other gatherings of this sort, and how the lifestyle continues to flourish in smaller gatherings were interspersed with music by some of the groups that were part of that historic concert winding up with Dylan's KNOCKING ON HEAVEN'S DOOR with Little Sparrow joining in. LOCAL LAW NUMBER 5 OF 2018

The BYO Bag Act results in the ban of single use plastic bag distribution at most retail locations and promotes all residents to use reusable bags when buying food or merchandise.

This law goes into effect on July 15, 2019 and covers all of Ulster County.

As of July 15th, 2019, you will not be able to receive single use plastic bags at the point of sale in grocery or retail stores. We encourage you to bring your own reusable bags, however if you forget, there will be a minimum 50 fee for paper bags upon checkout.

This law will go into effect before the New York State Plastic Bag Ban in March 2020. Based on the similarities of our laws, once the New York State Law comes into effect, there should be very few overall changes, especially for consumers.



Bring your own bag for no fee Any type of bag that the customers bring to the store themselves is encouraged.



Available for a 5¢ minimum fee Recyclable paper bags, bags made of cloth or washable material, or durable plastic over 4mm thick.

Not available for use Single use plastic bags less than 4mm thick and provided to customers at a point of sale

low Will this Affect You?

For Businesses: All businesses and markets selling personal, consumer or household items will withhold the distribution of plastic bags, however recyclable paper bags can be supplied for a minimum 5¢ fee. However, food service establishments such as restaurants, are not included in this law.

For Consumers: Consumers should start carrying reusable bags with them when shopping, as this is the most environmentally responsible approach. For durability, we recommend canvas bags. Recyclable paper bags will be available at checkouts for a minimum 50 fee.



This year we are celebrating the 234th year of the Declaration of Independence from England, adopted by the Second Continental Congress meeting at the Pennsylvania State House. The war was fought from Apr 19, 1775 - Sep 3, 1783 (8.4 years).

The first constitution of the United States were The Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union. It was drafted by the Second Continental Congress from mid-1776 through late 1777, and ratification by all 13 states was completed by early 1781.

People were not happy with the way the constitution was working, a new constitution was developed by educated and learned men. The final version that was put forth to the 13 states for ratification did not have the Bill of Rights. On September 28, 1787 the proposed new constitution was sent forth to the 13 states. Delaware being the first state to ratify it in December 7, 1787. On July 26, 1788, New York ratified the constitution, with a recommendation that a bill of rights be appended. Rhode Island on May 29, 1790 was the last state to ratify the new constitution with the Bill of Rights.


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
