One of Its Major Projects

Volunteers from around the community rallied to complete several beautification projects at the Grahamsville Fairgrounds. Two main areas were identified by the Neversink Agricultural Society for enhancement including the entranceways to the 4-H Building and Horse Barn. Ben Knight of Blooming Green Landscaping designed both gardens. The landscaping that extends across the front of the Horse Barn features a beautiful 24-foot garden that is edged by a hand laid stonewall. The construction of the stonewall was donated by the skilled workers of Darder Stone Works. The donated fieldstone used in this creation was handpicked by Renaissance volunteers from the farm of Jack and Carol Clark. Additional donations included a truck load of garden mix from Crystal Falls Farm and decorative stone from Woodbourne Lawn and Garden.

The 4-H Building entrance has a new shade garden that will welcome visitors. The garden design effectively utilizes existing mature shade trees and is edged with granite cobblestone donated by Blooming Green Landscaping. The building is used extensively at large Fairground events such as the Little World's Fair and Giant Pumpkin Party and has also been used as a wedding venue. Thank you to Jamie Brooks for coordinating this annual fun event.







Summertime and Snails

With the warm humid weather, anyone with a garden is quite aware of the presence of slugs and snails. The difference between a common slug and a snail is the snail has a conspicuous shell allowing the snail to completely retract into for defense.

Freshwater snails that are found in the eastern United States are only one of fifty thousand snails

worldwide that live on land and in water,

Snails, both land and water, that live in the Catskills are small with shells measuring an inch or less. Some

are spiral shaped, some coiled. All are herbivores; they eat only plants.

Snails travel in stomach-foot muscle and belong to the family Gastropods (gastro stomach, poda - foot).

Water snails move everywhere in the shallows of lakes, rivers and ponds, climbing up waterweed stems, gliding along the underside of lily pads and swinging through the water on mucous threads.

Land snails crawl over ground leaving a trail of shiny mucus that protects their soft bodies from sharp objects. They get back home by retracing the mucus trail.

Four hundred million years ago some snails left the ocean for tidal rivers and adapted to life in fresh water by breathing air with gills or storing oxygen in special

Snail shells are hardened secretions of calciummaking glands in the body or mantle and spiral around an axis called columnella. The final shape, spiral or round coil of the shell opens to the right or left, though most snails are right-handed.

To determine whether a snail is right-handed or lefthanded, hold the shell with the opening up and the pointed end away from you. The opening usually

faces right. Do the same thing for left-handed snails. Many water and land snails make a shell door or opercalum for protection when resting or when danger threatens. When the snail draws back into its shell, the door comes last, tightly closing the opening

Water snails have a head with two feelers, each with a tiny black eye at the base. Land snails have four feelers, two long and two short, with eyes on the

ends of the long ones.

Snails have several jaws on the roof of their mouth and a flexible tongue (radula) below which is covered by rows of sharp hooks and teeth that scrape algae off waterweeds or chew wee bites of green plants on land. Scientists use the different shapes and arrangements of these tiny teeth to identify snails.

Most snails lay eggs in jelly masses and stick them on rocks or debris in water or on land. You can clearly see babies moving around in their capsules. Other snails bear live young complete with shell that crawl

away immediately.

It's fun to set up an aquarium for watching snails. They can be collected quite easily in ponds. To make a small aquarium, put a layer of sand on the bottom of a large glass jar, plant a few waterweeds (from a pond or pet store) and add some green algae scraps. Algae grow on the glass sides and become favorite places for snails to graze. Add your snails and watch and wait. Snails will eventually lay eggs on the glass sides of the vessel. You can watch the babies

develop by using a magnifying glass to see them.

Water snails get eaten by frogs, turtles and most fish except trout. Land snails are relished by deer, birds and raccoons. Even people eat snails called escargots in restaurants and find them very tasty.

If your dog or cat should have a run-in with a skunk, vinegar will take care of the smell better than even tomato juice. Using vinegar diluted 50% with water, rub thecat or dog's fur. Rinse with warm water.

Repeat as needed.



Boating Accident on

Swinging Bridge Reservoir
On Sunday July 2, 2017 at approximately 10:00 PM, the Sullivan County Sheriff's Office responded to a report of a boating accident on the Swinging Bridge Reservoir in Monguap

Witnesses advised that a speed boat collided with a pontoon boat mid channel, in the vicinity of the Starlight Marina. The speed boat quickly sunk after the collision and the two occupants were rescued by the pontoon boat. When the pontoon boat brought the speed boat passengers to shore, the speed boat passengers suddenly jumped off the pontoon boat and fled into the adjacent woods. Sheriff's deputies conducted a search of the area overnight with negative results. The two occupants of the pontoon boat were taken to Catskill Regional Medical Center. One was treated for a fractured shoulder and the

other a leg injury.
Early Monday morning a local fisherman located the submerged speed boat in approximately 50 feet of water using side scan sonar. The Sullivan County Dive Team was called to the scene but was unable to enter the water due to an oil and gasoline leak from the submerged vessel. The Ulster County Sheriff's Office, Ulster Hose #5 and state police Dive Teams were contacted for mutual aid. These units have the proper gear to protect their divers in situations where the water has become polluted.

The sunken speed boat was raised up using air bags and at about 3:00 PM was floated to

shore.

Sheriff Mike Schiff thanked all the first responders who came to the scene to assist. "It is a real tribute to our emergency service members when you get so many of them to show up, even though it is a long the Fourth of July Weekend", said the Sheriff. Both boats are being impounded for forensic examination.

The occupants of the speed boat have not been heard from since they fled the scene. Anyone with information regarding this accident is urged to call the Sheriff's Office at 845-794-7100 or the confidential TIPS line at 845-807-0158. All calls will be kept confidential.

Robert Longo Enters Fallsburg Hall of Fame






800 New York Army National Guard Soldiers head to Australia for three week exercise on July 7

More than 800 New York Army National Guard Soldiers head for Australia on July 7 for a threeweek training exercise with the Australian Army.

The bulk of the Soldiers are assigned to the 1st Battalion, 69th Infantry which has units in Manhattan, Farmingdale, and Camp Smith Training Site near Peekskill.

Troop C from the 2nd Squadron, 101st Cavalry, based at Niagara Falls Air Reserve Station, an engineer platoon from the 27th Brigade Special Troops Battalion in Lockport and an intelligence section from the 27th Brigade Special Troops Battalion in Syracuse will also be part of the deployment.

The New York National Guard Soldiers are deploying as part of a regularly scheduled Australian/U.S. military exercise known as Talisman Sabre. The exercise is held every other year and involves 30,000 Australian and American military personnel at six different locations conducting field exercises and command and control exercises

Australia and the United States have been allies since the Second World War.

The bulk of the training in the field, which has focused on amphibious and air assault operations during past exercises, takes place at the Australian's Shoalwater Bay Training Area. The training site is located near Rockhampton in the Australian state of Queensland, along Australia's northeast coastline, north of Brisbane.

The extended annual training this year provides the battalion with an opportunity to conduct much more complex and integrated training for the combat Soldiers. A routine training period would only

encompass 15 days.

The New York Army National Guard Soldiers have been preparing for the mission for the past year, according to Lt. Col. Don Makay, the battalion commander. The Soldiers have conducted road marches with full field gear and tactical training exercises at the platoon and company level to get ready.

Unit Soldiers prepared and shipped equipment and 139 vehicles required for the mission to Australia and an advance party from the battalion is already in Australia. A team of Soldiers in Fort Lews, Washington prepared the vehicles and equip-

ment for shipment across the Pacific.

The Americans have also met with their Australian counterparts to prepare orders and plans that integrate the National Guard into the Australian Army unit they will be training with, Makay said. For the exercise, the 1st Battalion, 69th Infantry will be part of an Australian Army brigade.

This mission is a great way for the Citizen Soldiers of the 69th Infantry to demonstrate their ability to mobilize and deploy to anyplace in the

world, Makay said.

"An opportunity to work for the Australians is an opportunity to show that the 69th is prepared to lead and follow other allied formations," he said. The unit will return to New York at the end of the month.

County to Intervene in Compressor Application;

Proposed Water, Air, Noise Quality Study Garners Bidders

Monticello, NY - The Sullivan County Legislature yesterday unanimously agreed to ask the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) for intervenor status in the Eastern System Upgrade Project proposed by the Millennium Pipeline Company, which includes a 22,400-horsepower compressor station in the Town of Highland.

Such status, if granted by FERC, means the County will have the right to participate in hearings and other FERC proceedings related to this project. Millennium is asking FERC for permission to build the compressor station off Route 55 north of Eldred, along with other out-of-county upgrades to its existing natural gas transmission pipeline. The company seeks to put the additional infrastructure into operation by September 2018.

The Legislature's action follows more than a year of efforts to secure an environmental health impacts study of the site and surrounding area to address residents' and officials' concerns and provide useful data if the project moves forward. Several requests for proposals elicited either no interest from bidders or proposals which did not

meet the needs of the County.

"We had hoped by now to have a study in progress or ready to present to FERC, but with that effort still pending, we agreed as a Legislature that we must ensure we have a voice in the process," District 2 Legislator and Health & Family Services Committee Chair Nadia Rajsz explained. "This project remains of concern and controversy, and we will continue to monitor it closely."

"As the final authority on whether or not Millennium proceeds with this upgrade, FERC was previously notified that we were undertaking a study and wanted to be kept abreast of developments. This motion to intervene formalizes the Legislature's intent," affirmed District 1 Legislator Scott Samuelson, who co-introduced the resolution with Legislator Rajsz. "This demonstrates our commitment to the good health and quality of life of our residents and visitors."

In the meantime, County staff are reviewing four proposals received from a June request for an objective, scientific study of air, water and noise quality baseline data of the area surrounding the proposed compressor station site. A decision is expected to be made this month, with the study commencing shortly thereafter.



Sullivan County WIC Program Exceeds NYS Rates For Women Still Breastfeeding Infants by 6 Months of Age

Liberty, NY - Sullivan County is proud to announce its WIC (Women, Infants and Children) Program has exceeded the New York State rate for mothers who are exclusively breastfeeding their babies at 6 months of age.

The 2016 rate for Sullivan County mothers enrolled in WIC who were exclusively breastfeeding their infants at 6 months of age was 18.2% compared to

the state rate of 10.5%. In addition, breastfeeding initiation among women in the Sullivan County's Nutrition Program for WIC increased from 66.5% in 2011 to 80.1% in 2016, which is close to achieving the overall NYS rate of 83.4% announced by the NYS Health Commissioner earlier this month. This improvement represents a 33% increase in breastfeeding over five years for Sullivan County mothers enrolled in WIC.



"When Cauliflower Was King"

The rise and fall of the cauliflower industry in the Catskills will be the topic Saturday, July 15, 2017 when Diane Galusha, author of When Cauliflower Was King, speaks at the Olive Free Library, 4033 Route 28A, West Shokan. The 11 a.m. talk is free.

For a good part of the 20th century, the Catskills, in particular Delaware County, grew what was widely considered the best cauliflower anywhere. Mineral-rich soil, and a moderate climate with warm days and cool nights that usually allowed slow and solid head development, made this region famous for its premium quality cauliflower.

Almost every farm in the region planted some "white gold" to supplement their income. From the 1920s through the 1940s, local cauliflower was shipped in huge quantities via rail and highway to ready markets in New York, Philadelphia and Boston, making the Catskills synonymous with fine quality produce.

Marketing cooperatives worked together to increase efficiency and maximize profit. They created distinctive crate labels, distributed cauliflower cookbooks and engaged in other marketing efforts to get home cooks and restaurants to use cauliflower.

In the 1950s, a disease called brown rot, and competition from large scale growers in California and Long Island spelled the end of the cauliflower growing era for most family farms in the Catskills.

Diane Galusha is president of the Historical Society of the Town of Middletown which mounts exhibits in the History Tent at the annual Margaretville Cauliflower Festival, to be held September 23 in the Margaretville Village Park. She is also the author of several books of local and regional history, including Liquid Assets: A History of New York City's Water System, which was released in expanded format in 2016, and Another Day, Another Dollar, the Civilian Conservation Corps in the Catskills.
