Gioia Brock, neé Francis Chadwick Connell,



died May 24th, 2016. She was surrounded during her last days by her husband of 64 years, Mitchell Brock of Boca Grande FLClaryville, NY, daughter Felicity Kelcourse of Indianapolis, Brock Hovey Brooklyn, NY, daughter Brock Laura Manhattan, and one of

her seven grandchildren, Justin Brock-Smith. Gioia, a homemaker and artist, spent 24 years of active retirement with her husband Mitchell in Boca Grande, traveling to their home in the Catskill Mountains in spring and summer. Together they visited six continents, living three years in Paris and three years in Tokyo prior to Mitchell's retirement from the law firm of Sullivan

and Cromwell.

The daughter of Dr. Karl Connell, a physician and inventor, and Jennie Franklin Hovey Roof Connell, co-founder of the Women Fly Fisher's Club, Gioia was born in Greenwich Connecticut, the youngest of three children. She is preceded in death by Barbara Connell Mooney and survived by her brother Karl Connell of Naples, Florida and Frost Valley. Gioia attended the Masters School in Dobbs Ferry and Vassar College (class of 1951), employed as a social worker prior to her marriage to Mitchell in 1952 at the Unitarian Church of All Souls. While living in Manhattan she served as a docent for the Abigail Adams Smith Museum and volunteered at the Museum of Natural History. While in Paris she made recordings for the blind.

Gioia will be remembered for her love of beauty and nature. She could identify virtually all the fauna and flora of her native Catskill Mountains and belonged to the New York Mycological Society. With her husband she built a Japanese style house, collecting local moss and stones to create the surrounding gardens. An active member of her Grahamsville Quaker meeting, she was a life-long scholar and seeker. She imparted to her four children her love of learning and aesthetics: Felicity is a theological educator and psychother-apist, Marina, prior to her death in 2012, trained in design, Hovey is a visual artist and Laura is an art director and scenic artist, each reflecting some aspect of their mother's interests and talents.

A memorial service for Gioia will be held at the church in Claryville, New York on Friday August 5th, 4pm, with a second memorial service to be held in Boca Grande in the fall. Tick Talk Program Offered

Don't let ticks keep you indoors this Summer. There are many ways you can reduce your risk of tick bites and Lyme Disease. Saturday, July 16th, at 10:30am join Public Health Educator Jill Hubert-Simon for a free public program "Tick Talk: It's Lyme Time!" at Morgan Outdoors in Livingston Manor NY.

Participants will learn how to identify the different ticks found in our area and which ones can cause Lyme Disease. They will also learn ways to minimize the risk of tick bites while enjoying the great outdoors and ways to reduce the number of ticks in their backyard and on pets. Snails and Slugs

With the warm humid weather I am sure anyone with a garden is quite aware of the presence of slugs and snails. Four hundred million years ago some snails left the ocean for tidal rivers and adapted to life in fresh water by breathing air with gills or storing oxygen in special lung sacs. The Snails and slugs that we see in our back yards are both gastropod mollusks, and unlike most gastropods they are terrestrial, that is they are found on land. They travel in stomach-foot

muscle and belong to the family Gastropods (gastro - stomach, poda - foot).

The difference between a common slug and a snail is the snail has a conspicuous shell large allowing the snail to completely retract into for defense. Some snails

are also able to close off their shell once fully retracted. Slugs



do not have this convenience but instead have an internal undeveloped shell where calcium is stored. Because there's no shell, the slug can maneuver and compress itself into hiding places with very little space, e.g. loose bark on trees or beneath stone slabs and wooden boards. This gives it a great survival advantage.

Other than this obvious exterior feature, both mollusks have several similar features, like eye spots at the end of slender tentacles. The tentacles feel what the simple eye spots may not see. Land snails have two pairs of tentacles. The rounded tips are primarily odor-sensing chemoreceptors that enable the snail to smell its environment. The upper two tentacles also bear eye spots at their tips enabling the snail to detect movement and shades of gray.

Snails and slugs have several jaws on the roof of their mouth and a flexible tongue (radula) below which is covered by rows of sharp hooks and teeth that scrape algae off waterweeds or chew wee bites of

green plants on land.

Slugs and snails all crawl at different speeds. The most common speed is about 0.002 mph. The way snails and slugs move is very interesting. An individual propels itself by sending wave after wave of small contractions forward from the back of its foot toward the front. In effect, they move on only one foot. Snails and slugs have broad, muscular, flat-bottom feet, which is lubricated by mucus and covered with epithelial cilia, a thin tissue that forms the outer layer of the body's surface with hair-like vibrating structures.

One adaptation enabling land snails and slugs to survive on land is their ability to produce plenty of slimy mucous that prevents moisture in the animals' bodies from being soaked up by the dry terrain being

traveled across.

If you've watched a land snail or a slug moving across a dry surface, you may have noticed that it left a silvery trail. This trail is mucous the creature lays down beneath it as it travels Land snails and slugs move upon this layer of mucous that protects their soft bodies from sharp objects. They get back home by retracing the mucus trail.

Most land snails and slugs possess both male and female parts. In some species, an individual may behave as male for a while, then as a female. In a few snail and slug species, self-fertilization occurs -- an hermaphroditic individual mates with itself and produces offspring.

Both slugs and snails prefer hot and humid climates with ample shade for hiding.

During a drought slugs and snails will go underground or beneath rocks or fallen trees, where they remain in suspended animation, waiting for rain.

With the rain over the past weekend you shouldn't have problems finding snails and slugs. They're found at the base of your house's foundation mostly on the shady northern side, or maybe nibbling lettuce in the garden.



Bull Mountain

This week's author had a metric ton of A-list crime fiction writers heaping praise on his debut novel when it first appeared in the fall of last year. The likes of C.J. Box, John Connolly, James Ellroy and others were all highly complimentary of his work in their endorsements . . . and rightfully so, for it became a runway hit . . . which I am chagrined to say I couldn't find the time to review. But now it's coming out in trade paperback form, giving me a shot at redemption. I won't miss it a second time . . . it's just too damp good.



Bull Mountain, (Putnam/Penguin Random House, \$26.95, 290 pages, ISBN 978-0-399-17396-7) by Brian Panowich defies convention, and classification too. It's a riveting thriller set in the southern Appalachian Mountains of northeast Georgia that's partly a family saga, part crime fiction, part fable and part mystery. It defies genre and could be called southern, Appalachian, or hillbilly noir. Whatever name we call it, Bull Mountain will grab your attention with the first sentence and nail your brain to the plot until the last word on the last page when you'll say, "Please, Sir. May I have some more?"

Told in alternating voices, times and points of view, the novel begins in 1949, when a fateful decision up on *Bull Mountain* propels the Burroughs clan into the drug trade and away from running 'shine, their traditional business. By 2015, the two surviving grandsons are at odds. Halford controls Bull Mountain and all of an interstate drug empire, while his younger brother Clayton is the county Sheriff. An uneasy truce exists between the two because, while Clayton has the law on his side, Halford has the guns on his. The standoff evaporates with the appearance of a Federal Agent from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms who plans to end the criminal empire with an agenda all his own . . . pitting brother against brother in a devastating test to see whether good or evil will prevail. With dynamic, hard-edged prose and a compelling narrative coupled with a multi-generational saga, *Bull Mountain* is a first novel that's got some serious chops. I'm eager to see what author Panowich comes up with next. Hillbilly Noir . . . count me in!

The Prescription Medication Drop-Off Program gives people a place to dispose of their unused prescription medications instead of flushing them down the drain or throwing them in the garbage where they can contaminate groundwater.

Prescription drug abuse is on the rise across the country. Prescription drugs such as painkillers can be highly addictive and every bit as dangerous as street

drugs.

When abused or misused, prescription drugs can even be deadly. Fatal drug overdoses are now the primary cause of death due to unintentional injury in the U.S., exceeding even motor vehicle deaths, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control.

Preventing Drug Abuse

To help stop prescription drugs from falling into the wrong hands, take advantage of prescription drug boxes after the prescribed patient no longer needs them. Parents should consider locking up prescription drugs in the home to protect their children. Educating Young People

Prescription drugs are the second most abused drug among young people ages 12-17. According to the National Center on Addiction and Drug Use at Columbia University, nearly nine million U.S. teens report that they can get prescription drugs illicitly within one day and 5 million say that they can get them

within one hour.

The substation Drop-Off boxes are available for public dropoff by appointment only. However, drop-offs can be made if a deputy is present at the substation when a member of the public arrives to make a drop-off.

"The Catskills ("Cat Creek" in Dutch), America's original frontier, northwest of New York City, with its seven hundred thousand acres of forest land preserve and its five counties-Delaware, Greene, Sullivan, Ulster, Schoharie; America's first great vacationland; the subject of the nineteenthcentury Hudson River School paintings that captured the almost godlike majesty of the mountains and landscapes, the skies, waterfalls, pastures, cliffs . . . refuge and home to poets and gangsters, tycoons

and politicians, preachers and outlaws, musicians and spiritualists, outcasts and rebels.

Stephen Silverman and Raphael Silver tell of the turning points that made the Catskills so vital to the development of America: Henry Hudson's first spotting the distant blue mountains in 1609, the New York State constitutional convention, resulting in New York's own Declaration of Independence from Great Britain and its own constitution, causing the ire of the invading British army . . . the Catskills as a popular attraction in the 1800s, with the construction of the Catskill Mountain House and its rugged imitators that offered WASP guests "one-hundred percent restricted" accommodations ("Hebrews will knock vainly for admission"), a policy that remained until the Catskills became the curative for tubercular patients, sending real-estate prices plummeting and the WASP enclave on to richer pas-tures." 

said Legislator Thomas J. Briggs. "Our military personnel have done so much for us and we must, in turn, do our part as a community to thank them, and this property tax exemption is just a small part of doing just that."

The new law raises the ceiling for property tax exemptions extended to honorably discharged Veterans and Cold War Veterans to \$45,000, with an additional exemption of up to \$30,000 for those Veterans who served in a combat zone. The law also provides an additional exemption of up to \$150,000 for those Veterans who have suffered a military service-related disability.

Ulster County last updated these property tax exemptions in 2012 as part of a comprehensive initiative by County Executive Hein to provide property tax relief to Veterans, seniors, and first time home buyers.



The poem was sent to the Sullivan County Democrat by Callicoon resident John Fink.

New York State Utility Regulator to Investigate Sudden Loss of Power at Indian Point – State Agencies Directed to

Reduce Power Usage

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo directed the New York State Department of Public Service to closely monitor statewide energy usage due to weather predictions of high temperatures and humidity for much of the week across New York State. As part of these monitoring efforts, Governor Cuomo also directed the Department to investigate the cause of an unexpected shut down of Indian Point 2 earlier today, which was not heat-related. The Department will evaluate the cause of the shut down and assess steps that should be taken to avoid future events.

The ongoing heat event is having a direct and immediate impact on electricity usage. At this point in time, the system has enough resources to maintain reliability. However, residential and business consumers are encouraged to seek ways to reduce their energy usage, where possible. To help lower demand, Governor Cuomo has directed that all State agencies immediately lower their energy usage by turning off lights, raising air conditioning temperatures, closing window shades, and powering down unused comput-

ers, printers and other electrical devices.

As a result of the high demand on the electric system, DPS staff has been in communication with the State's utilities and the New York Independent System Operator to ensure that they are prepared for any heat-related outages, including current and planned communications with customers. DPS will continue to monitor conditions and ensure that the utility companies take appropriate steps to manage the demand for energy.

SNAP Expansion Will Bring up to \$688 Million Additional Federal Funds to New York State

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced that 750,000 additional working families are now eligible for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program or SNAP- which helps fight hunger among working New Yorkers. As outlined in the Governor's State of the State Address, the state has adopted the recommendation of the Governor's Anti-Hunger Task Force to increase the amount working households can earn

and still qualify for SNAP. The SNAP expansion, effective July 1, is expected to bring as much as \$688.5 million annually in additional federally-funded SNAP benefits to New York State, with an estimated annual economic impact of up to \$1.27 billion.

"We are one New York and allowing any of our neighbors to go hungry is unacceptable and is against the very values this state was founded upon," Governor Cuomo said. "This action will help put food on the table for hundreds of thousands more New York families and is a bold step toward stamping out hunger

in Empire State once and for all."

Eligibility for SNAP is determined by income and household size, though other factors, such as age and disability of household members, can also impact benefit levels. Applicants for SNAP must pass a two-part test to determine whether they are eligible. Before there is a careful review of a person's actual, or net, income and expenses, there is an initial hurdle - the Gross Income Test - which requires that the applicant's total household income is below 130 percent of the federal poverty level, or \$2,177 a month for a

The Governor has directed the New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, which oversees SNAP, to raise the Gross Income Test level to 150 percent of poverty, or \$2,512 a month for a family of three, for all working households. This will extend eligibility to as many as 750,000 households that currently do not receive

SNAP benefits.

New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance Commissioner Samuel D. Roberts said, "Thanks to Governor Cuomo's leadership, low-income working families will be able to access the help they need to overcome food insecurity. We are committed to furthering the Governor's agenda in addressing hunger and to ensure that anyone eligible for nutrition assistance is receiving it."

FreshConnect Checks

SNAP participants may also use their benefits to purchase healthy, fresh food options at participating farmers' markets in New York, and through the FreshConnect Checks program they can make their

benefits go even further.

This year, funding for FreshConnect Checks, administered by the State Department of Agriculture and Markets, has been increased to \$425,000 and the program is also operating year-round. FreshConnect Checks provide a \$2.00 incentive for every \$5.00 in SNAP benefits used. This allows SNAP consumers to increase their buying power by 40 percent while also supporting local farmers. Checks for the summer/fall season are available now. For a map of participating markets visit http://freshconnect.ny.gov/.

Since 2011, more than 240,000 checks have been used by SNAP participants across the state.

SNAP at Farmers' Markets

At participating farmers' markets, customers can use their Electronic Benefit Transfer card to purchase \$1 and \$5 tokens with their SNAP benefits. The tokens then act as cash within the market for purchasing food. The City of Rochester Public Market, which operates the largest SNAP redemption program of any Farmers Market in the country, sold \$624,000 in tokens in 2015, to more than 7,000 customers.

To better serve SNAP customers, a re-purposed shipping container has been acquired with a SNAP Farmers Market Support Grant, from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This creative and affordable alternative for housing the SNAP Token center will more efficiently serve the increasing number of customers who purchase SNAP tokens to make purchases from 115 farmers and food vendors at the year-round market.

Gillibrand Announces USDA to Expand Barley Crop Insurance Coverage to NYS Producers, Bossing Local **Breweries & Distilleries**

U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand today announced that the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Risk Management Agency (RMA) will be expanding conventional barley crop insurance to 13 new counties this year and an additional 16 counties for crop year 2017. Additionally, RMA will begin offering coverage for malting barley in four counties beginning in 2017. This expansion comes after Senator Gillibrand called on USDA Secretary Vilsack to provide crop insurance for barley in all counties in New York where production is possible. Prior to this expansion, barley crop insurance was only available in 28 counties across New York. Since 2011, there has been a 72 percent increase in farm-based breweries, cideries, and distilleries in New York, which has created significant demand for barley and other small grains.

"Expanding crop insurance for barley is an important step to sustain and improve the viability of our farms and connected industries," said Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, the first New York Senator to serve on the Senate Agriculture Committee in nearly 40 years. "A key to encouraging producers to plant these crops is to ensure that they can manage their risk with appropriate crop protection programs. Expanding crop insurance will help meet the growing demand of breweries and distilleries throughout New York.'

In her letter to USDA, Gillibrand explained there are many producers outside these areas that would benefit from crop insurance for barley. By expanding the current barley crop and developing a production history, insurers would have the data they need to create coverage for valuable malting barley that already covers nearly 2,000 acres of

New York farmland.

Due to the New York State farm Brewing Law passed in 2012, a certain percentage of gain used in production must be grown in New York State. The legislation was designed to increase demand for locally grown products to further increase economic impact and create new businesses surrounding the brewing industry.

The conditions of a Farm Brewery license in

New York State are:

o Until the end of 2018, at least 20% of the hops and 20% of all other ingredients must be grown in New York State.

o From January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2023, no less than 60% of the hops and 60% of all other ingredients must be grown in New York State. o From January 1, 2024, no less than 90% of the hops and 90% of all other ingredients must be

grown in New York State.

Under the RMA policy to be offered in 2017, if a producer holds a contract to sell malting barley and suffers a yield loss, the insurance can pay up to 1.85 times of the RMA established barley market price for that loss.

Congressmen Gibson announces passage of Helping Families in Mental Health Crisis Act

Congressman Chris Gibson (NY-19) announced the passage today of HR 2646, the Helping Families in Mental Health Crisis Act of 2016, a bipartisan bill he co-authored to significantly overhaul federal policy in support of individuals and families coping with serious mental health challenges.

HR 2646, which was introduced by Congressman Tim Murphy, Ph.D. (PA-18) and had 207 co-sponsors, passed by a vote of 422-2.

"As the husband of a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, and as a longtime advocate for mental health and suicide prevention programs, it was a special honor for me to partner with Doctor Murphy in advancing this critical legislation, said Congressman Gibson. "Too many families lack access to treatment, including hospitalization, for conditions like schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, and major depression. Sadly, this has led to an increase in violent acts and homelessness. The shuttering of psychiatric facilities over the last few decades was not accompanied by any significant new approach to caring for people in des-perate need of help. Our bill makes real progress towards repairing the broken mental health system, and I look forward to continuing our advocacy to see it signed into law this year.

The Helping Families in Mental Health Crisis Act commits new resources to psychiatric care and overhauls federal policy to, among other

goals,

o Grow the number of pediatricians and primary care doctors trained in behavioral health;

o Integrate mental healthcare into the broader U.S. medical system;

o Remove legal hurdles to securing care for a loved

 Establish an assistant secretary for mental health and substance use disorders to run the Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Agency and coordinate mental health programs across the federal gov-

 Expand access to assisted outpatient treatment and hospital stays for adults and children with serious mental health challenges;

Commit block grants to local services for people with serious mental health challenges;

o Require the National Institute of Mental Health to translate best available science into patient care systems; and

o Amend Medicaid regulations to broaden coverage for mental health services. In terms of cost, the legislation is fully offset. Related bills are under consideration in the Senate.


