

These groups are intended to provide both support and new resources to the informal family caregiver who assists an aging, ill, or disabled adult relative or friend. Bonnie Lewis, RN, CCESC dependent care educator, uses the AARP curriculum "Caring for Those You Care About" to facilitate meetings, along with various other educational resources.

There are four CRC support groups open to the

public:

o "Share the Care" group meets at 10:00 am on the first Wednesday of each month at Lander's River Café in Callicoon, NY.

o "Caring for the Caregiver" group meets at 10:00 am on the second Tuesday of each month at Eureka

Café in Grahamsville, NÝ.

o "Caregiver Conversations" group meets at 6:00 pm on the last Wednesday of each month at CCESC's Gerald J. Skoda Extension Education Center in Liberty, NY.

o "Alzheimer's Support" group meets at 10:00 am on the third Thursday of each month at Action Toward Independence in Monticello, NY. This group is intended for caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's disease or dementia.

These meetings provide an opportunity to listen, learn, and share in a comfortable space while finding assistance with caregiving concerns. The support groups offer a safe place for:

o Sharing feelings, frustrations, and practical ways of coping

Meeting other caregivers who are in similar situations and can offer practical advice

> Fascinating Fireflies Light the Path to Summer

Monday we will be the first day of summer, also known as the Summer Solstice or Midsummer, the longest day of the year. To the ancients, Midsummer brought mystery and power.

Fireflies appear on or near Midsummer's Eve. To many, they still bring back memories of the magical time of youth when Firelies danced through the darkness captivating our imagination



as they became the "Firefly Faeries" when wishes were made and dreams were dreamt.

Fireflies are beautiful, mysterious, amazing little creatures that are a sign of summer.

Fireflies have fascinated mankind for thousands of years. They were among the first luminescent animals to have been recorded in ancient literature in the *Chinese Book of Odes* that was written somewhere between 1500 and 1000 B.C. Shakespeare'

makes reference to fireflies in Midsummer Night's

These little creatures grow up to one inch. The larvae, that also glow, usually live for approximately one year, from mating season to mating season, before becoming adults and giving birth to the next generation. The larvae eat snails, worms, and slugs, which they inject with a disabling numbing chemical. Adults eat other fireflies, nectar, or pollen, and some don't eat at all during this short period of their life. 2 months flying in the wild.

life, 2 months flying in the wild.

Fireflies a/k/a Lightening bugs, are of the Lampyridae family of insects in the order Coleoptera. They are not flies. They are actually beetles that talk to each other with light. Fireflies emit light to attract mates. They also use their light emitting apparatus to communicate for other reasons including defending territory and to warn pred-

ators to go away.

In most firefly species, both sexes glow; often the male will fly, while females will wait in trees, shrubs and grasses to spot an attractive male. Females can tell right away if a male firefly has what it takes (a protein booster) by the vigor of his flashed code. When she finds the right one, she'll signal him with a flash of her own.

The intermittent light they naturally produce is a phenomenon called bioluminescence. The bioluminescent organs in fireflies are found on the under-

side of the abdomen.

A firefly contains two chemicals: luciferase and luciferin. Luciferin is heat resistant, and it glows under the right conditions. Luciferase is an enzyme that triggers light emission. ATP, (Adenosine triphosphate) a chemical within the firefly's body, that converts the chemicals to energy and initiates the glow. Wavelength of this light is between 510 and 670 nanometers, making it appear like a pale yellow or orange-green color to us. In the area of the body where the light-making reaction happens—called the photic organ or the lantern—there are uric acid crystals that help reflect the light away from the abdomen.

How fireflies control their glow is still a mystery. There are several hypotheses that point to oxygen intake, messages from the brain, and other methods for controlling the lantern. However fireflies turn their light on and off, scientists believe the main pur-

pose of the glow is for love!

Firefly lights are the most efficient lights in the world; 100% of the energy is emitted as light.

Firefly populations appear to be declining. One theory is that light pollution interrupts Firefly flash patterns and impacts a Firefly's ability to find a mate. With very little light pollution in Sundown and many other areas in Tri-Valley, lightening bugs continue to provide an extraordinary 'light show' in our back yards lighting up our summer nights, still bringing a sense of magic and mystery to our environment.

When you see Fireflies, or "lightening bugs", flashing its lights, you can rest assured that love is in the air and all is well in the garden and in the forest.



Purgatory


Mysterious Book Report No. 244

Once the envy of the entire world soon after the millennium, the Celtic Tiger has died in Ken Bruen's 2013 novel *Purgatory*, (Mysterious Press, \$24.00, 278 pages, ISBN 978-0-8021-2607-8) and been replaced with an Ireland that can only be described as circling the economic drain. With jobs non-existent, crime is rampant, the young professionals are emigrating and real estate has sunk to such low prices that vulture investors are busy buying distressed property from the near bankrupt lending institutions as fast as the paperwork is finished. In Galway, an outcast Jack Taylor has physically healed from the wounds that left him deaf, limping and missing two fingers. He's trying to move on with his life, to make the most of his remaining time on earth and exorcise the triple demons of alcohol, tobacco and prescription painkillers that've tormented him for most of his days. He's moved and changed his habits as well as his old haunts in a heartfelt attempt to make the changes stick, but Galway isn't big enough for a man as notorious as Taylor to find anonymity.

Someone's always recognizing the irascible, long-suffer-



ing, ever perspicacious detective and beseeching him to take on their anguishing case, or reopening old wounds with "Hey aren't you the one who . . ."
Taylor's reply is always short and to the point: "I don't care." But when a vigilante starts to systematically murder the city's low-lifes, and leaves enigmatic notes signed C33 taunting Jack to 'join the fun' and help cleanse the gene-pool . . . he can't ignore the case. Nor can he ignore the fact that his celebrity causes an eccentric billionaire who's in the process of buying most of Galway on the cheap to seek him out for all the wrong reasons. Taylor's life begins spinning out of control again as his legions of personal demons, both past and present, threaten to push him into a well of darkness that has no bottom





I am proud to support this forward-thinking initiative and will continue to work with my colleagues to ensure we are taking all the necessary steps to significantly mitigate climate change.'

This legislation, known as the New York State Climate and Community Protection Act, requires the state Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to establish statewide greenhouse gas emissions limits and reporting standards and regulations to achieve the necessary reductions (A.10342). Additionally, under this act, 50 percent of electricity would need to be produced by renewable energy systems by 2030.

The bill also includes provisions requiring the identification of at-risk communities as well as local

barriers to and opportunities for renewable energy generation, energy efficiency, weatherization investments and low-emission transportation options.

As former Chair of the Assembly Standing Committee on Energy, Assemblymember Cahill led the way on numerous initiatives to promote clean power generation, sustainable building practices and the development of an environmentally-friendly workforce. Under his leadership, legislation passed to take proceeds from the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative, the carbon emission tax trade program, to direct funding toward communities and small businesses and create a workforce to implement conservation and efficiency measures. 

A Holstein cow complete with an udder is the focal point of the farm scene.


Around her are a few farming objects for visitors to use.

Fun, Family-Friendly Activities at Upper Delaware BioBlitz (From Pg 11)

A BioBlitz is an event where teams of scientists gather on a demarcated property for 24 hours to collect, identify, and catalogue a single specimen of every single species they can find. The latter part of the event is open to the public for youth and their families to meet the scientists, see what they have collected, and learn more about biology in the context of the site. Teams of researchers will focus on specific categories of life, including aquatic macroinvertebrates, birds, plants, fish, fungi, reptiles and amphibians, invertebrates, mammals, and mosses and lichens. The scientists are asked to identify what they find down to the species level, if possible, using specialized methods. Some of this will be done in the field either by photos or visual identification. Other items will be brought back to the collection tables for further identification through careful analysis using microscopes and reference material on site.

All of the data will be compiled into an inventory of species collected during the event and will be publicly available to help future scientists understand what was living on the site at this particular time, including rare or endangered species. Experts will travel from far distances to study this unique area of New York State. Scientists are participating from the Academy of Natural Sciences of Drexel University, Cornell University, East Stroudsburg University, Penn State University, and other academic, nonprofit and governmental organizations.

A portion of this property is within the National Park Service's Upper Delaware Scenic and Recreational River corridor and borders the river at the Ten Mile River Access. The BioBlitz site will also include the Indian Cliffs, Rock Lake, Mahl's Pond, and Grassy Swamp Pond, one of the only quaking bogs to be scientifically authenticated in

the Catskills.

Upper Delaware BioBlitz participating organizations and sponsors include Catskill Mountainkeeper, Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan County, Delaware Highlands Conservancy, Delaware Highlands Mushroom Society, Delaware Riverkeeper Network, Friends of the Upper Delaware River, Greater New York Councils, Boy Scouts of America, National Park Service, Upper Delaware, Scenic and Recreational River, Open Space Institute, Sullivan County Audubon Society, Upper Delaware Council. Delaware Highlands Conservancy is the fiscal sponsor for the event, and all contributions to the event through the Conservancy are tax-deductible.

Million \$22 for New the Revitalization Neighborhood Program to Help Low- and Middle-Income New Yorkers Buy and Vacant, Distressed Renovate Properties - \$27 Million in Grants to Assist Existing Eligible Homeowners Renovations

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced more than \$100 million in available funds to help new homebuyers purchase and renovate "Zombie" properties and assist existing low- and middle-income homeowners with major repairs and renovations. Funding is available through the New York State Homes and Community Renewal to establish the new Neighborhood Revitalization Program and provide grants for not-for-profit organizations and municipalities throughout the state to rehabilitate, repair and improve homes.

"Abandoned and foreclosed 'zombie properties' drag down surrounding home values and can impact the economic health and public safety of entire communities," Governor Cuomo said. "With these new programs, we are taking action to crack down on these neighborhood blights, and help more New Yorkers achieve and maintain the American Dream of homeownership."

Neighborhood Revitalization Program:

The Homes and Community Renewal's Neighborhood Revitalization Program will help subsidize and finance the purchase and renovation of up to 500 foreclosed and abandoned properties for low- and middle-income New Yorkers.

The new NRP strengthens communities by preventing further decline of property values and neighborhoods due to blight, restoring properties to the tax rolls and providing communities with the revenue necessary for municipal services. The program is vital to preserving the integrity and safety of low-income communities that are disproportionately affected by vacant and aban-

doned properties.

The NRP is administered by HCR's State of New York Mortgage Agency. Using data and working with local nonprofits and municipalities, SONYMA identified six target communities with a high concentration of zombie properties that are undermining coordinated local government investment in housing and economic development.

These communities have an owner-occupancy rate that sustains homeownership, a track record of strong partnerships with experienced nonprofit housing agencies that provide homeownership counseling and additional sources of gap funding. In each community, SONYMA will work with experienced real estate professionals, housing nonprofits, and mortgage lenders to identify and market eligible properties, locate qualified buyers, determine the scope and cost of renovations, and structure the mortgages. Local nonprofit homeownership counseling agencies will help administer the program and provide homebuyer education, prescreen prospective buyers, and help access additional available subsidies and resources. These agencies are responsible for ensuring that renovations are code compliant. SONYMA also requires prospective purchasers to complete a homebuyer education class as a prerequisite to receiving funds through the NRP. Financed with \$22 million in JPMorgan Chase

settlement funds, NRP home purchases will be made through SONYMA's Purchase Renovation Mortgage, which allows qualified low- and middle-income buyers to receive up to \$20,000 in additional funds for home improvements with zero interest, does not increase their mortgage payments and is forgiven over time. This financing can be used with other subsidies or grants and can be applied to all renovation expenses, permit fees, consultant fees, inspection fees and contingency funds.

The program will be implemented in communities in the Hudson Valley: RUPCO, Pat

Senate Adopts Legislation Requiring the State to Fund Mandates

A bill that requires the state to fund any new mandate it imposes on local governments and schools passed the State Senate yesterday and was delivered to the Assembly for consideration.

The measure (S.2295) is sponsored by Senator Joseph Griffo (Lewis, Oneida, St. Lawrence counties) and passed the Senate by a wide margin (49-12, unofficially). Griffo is a former Oneida County Executive.

"We applaud Senator Griffo and members of the Senate for passing this legislation in recognition of the burden that state mandates place on municipal and school property taxpayers," said NYSAC President William E. Cherry, the Schoharie County Treasurer. "Now we ask that members of the Assembly move this measure to the floor for a vote before the end of the session."

Property taxes are the number one fiscal burden for homeowners and businesses, as well as the largest impediment to economic growth and job creation in Upstate New York and Long Island.

The major contributing factor for high property taxes is that the State, as a matter of public policy, uses local property taxes to support a wide variety of state initiatives and public policy goals.

In 2015, nine state mandates consumed 99% of the property taxes levied by counties outside of New York City. For just one program- Medicaid- counties spend \$7.4 billion annually, which is more than local governments in any other state contribute to their state's fiscal plan.

"Every time the state enacts a new mandated program, it's often left up to municipalities and school districts to find a way to pay for the new program," Griffo told the Madison County Courier newspaper after his bill passed the Senate. "But, local municipalities and school districts are fiscally-stressed enough, so they should have the freedom to decide what priorities and services they believe are worth funding for their communities, instead of being forced by the state to levy new taxes."

"We thank Senator Griffo and his colleagues who voted in the affirmative on this bill. If we want to address the property tax burden in New York State, then we have to first reform the way we fund state mandated programs and services. This bill is moving us all in the right direction," said NYSAC Executive Director Stephen J. Acquario. hStone and Rural Development Advisory Council

Her work has been exhibited in New York City and the Hudson Valley area, and the inspiration for this painting series was the

Tara Kopp received her Bachelor of Fine Arts from the Rhode Island School of Design and Master of Fine Arts from Pratt Institute. Her Midwest roots influence her current work, where issues of idealized domestic settings are depicted in what could take place in any suburban town, USA. 

CCE Sullivan 4-H Shooting Sports Receives 5K from NRA

LIBERTY - For the second year in a row, the National Rifle Association (NRA) has awarded an equipment grant to Cornell Cooperative Extension Sullivan County (CCESC)'s 4-H Shooting Sports program. In 2015, the program received \$2,500 in equipment, including targets and new firearms and bows, so youth didn't have to use older, heavy, and less accurate models. This year, the NRA doubled the grant to \$5,000 in recognition of the strength, growth, and importance of the program for young people in Sullivan County. Exciting new equipment secured with the grant includes challenge targets, a spotting scope, and a full laser shot simulator system. The simulator can be used for public demonstrations and gives youth who are too young to handle live firearms an opportunity for early practice.

Led by a group of local, screened, and trained volunteers with CCESC staff support, Sullivan's 4-H Shooting Sports program is a leader in the state. Certified Volunteer Instructor, Richard Sheldon, rebuilt the defunct program just over two years ago, and has grown enrollment to the second largest program in the state. 4-H Shooting Sports volunteers go through hours of training and pass proper knowledge, skills, and attitudes around firearms on to youth as young as 7 and up to age 19. Classroom sessions are hosted at the Gerald J. Skoda Extension Education Center on Ferndale-Loomis Road in Liberty, once per month. Weather permitting, the SportsMen's Den in Callicoon provides a safe space for age-eligible program participants to practice safe handling and use of

Free Tastings for Customers are also Sales-Tax Free for Breweries, Wineries, and Distilleries

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced the Beer Production Credit has been expanded to include New York's wine, spirits, and cider industries. The credit, now referred to as the Alcohol Production Credit, is expected to save wineries, distillers and cideries an additional \$4 million over the next two years, allowing them to reinvest in their businesses.

"New York is the epicenter of a burgeoning craft beverage industry and this administration has worked hard to cut red tape and lower costs to help encourage further _growth," Governor Cuomo said. "These actions continue our efforts and will help wineries, cideries and distillers in every corner of the state reinvest in their businesses and create jobs and economic activity."

The credit is available annually to craft beverage businesses producing 60 million gallons or less of beer or cider, 20 million gallons or less of wine, and 800,000 gallons or less of liquor in New York State. The expansion is effective for the 2016 tax year. It was included in the 2016-17 Enacted State Budget, and builds on the Beer Production Credit, which was launched in 2012. To date, the Beer Production Tax Credit has saved New York's breweries \$11 million.
