# It's Up to the People -After 50 Years, Legislature Poised to Pass Bill to Allow Casino Gaming in Catskills State Senator John J. Bonacic (R/C/I - Mt. Hope) and Assemblyman Gary Pretlow introduced legislation (S. 5882/A. 8101) that is a great the Senator and Assembly.

introduced legislation (S.5883/A.8101) that is expected to pass the Senate and Assembly this week to authorize up to four casinos across three regions, including the Catskills, if voters approve the plan this November.

In May, Governor Cuomo proposed allowing up to 3 casinos to be spread across 6 upstate regions. Bonacic countered with a bill that would allow up to 5 casinos to be spread across three regions. The legislation expected to pass will allow 4 casinos across three upstate regions.

Senator Bonacic said, "For fifty years, the Catskills have sought gaming as a way to grow our tourism based economy. The gaming bill can create thousands of upstate jobs. New Yorkers now have a choice - keep our money in-state - creating jobs, improving education, and providing resort entertainment experiences; or help Connecticut, New Jersey, and Massachusetts. 



#### The Soft Fragrance of a Wild Rose

Has anyone smelled the roses by the Grahamsville Post Office? Last Wednesday was a beautiful and the smell of the wild roses coming from the prolific bushes in back of the post office was magnificent.

Although these little showy flowers that create a living fence are very fragnant, they are now considered an invasive



species in some states, as they are difficult to contain. The wild rose, rosa multiflora, is a species rose native to Asia. It is a robust perennial shrub with thorny arching stems. Originally introduced to help with soil erosion, hedging and food for wildlife, it's vigor and hardiness has enabled it to spread quickly.




multiflora Rosa blooms once in June, with clusters of white, honey-scented blossoms. These true wild roses are all single with exactly five petals and each flower has numerous pollen containing stamens in the center. The blossoms grow on the smallleaved climbing shrub that often uses other trees and shrubs for their support, and can grow over 15 feet in height.

By fall, the numerous blossoms will mature into a berry-like seed-bearing fruit; bright red rose hips. Wild rose hips persist on the plant during much of the winter. Many birds and mammals depend on the dry fruits when the ground is covered with snow. Their fruits or hips are tasty treats for wildlife and contain

Vitamin A and C.

The sharp objects along the stem are commonly called "thorns", but they are technically prickles; outgrowths of the outer layer of tissue of the stem, or epidermis. Rosa multiflora prickles are typically sickle-shaped hooks, which aid the wild rose in hanging onto other vegetation when # growing over it

The rosa multiflora is truly a Wild Rose. According to the botanical term for a wild rose or "species rose" means the species occurs naturally and



needs no help from a human. Multiflora rose was introduced to the eastern United States in 1866 as rootstock for ornamental roses. Beginning in the 1930s, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service promoted it for use in erosion control and as "living fences" to confine livestock. State conservation departments recommended multiflora rose as cover for wildlife. More recently, it has been planted in highway median strips to serve as crash barriers and reduce automobile headlight glare. Its tenacious growth habit was eventually recognized as a problem on pastures and unplowed lands, where it disrupted cattle grazing, and, more recently, it is perceived as a pest of the natural ecosystems. It is designated a noxious weed in several states, including Iowa, Ohio, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and West Virginia.


The rose, in all its variety and color, was made the New York State flower in 1955. Roses have been appreciated throughout the centuries and considered the symbol of love and has been mentioned in many writings throughout history. #### Purge bugs from your pantry

Do you have moths or other insects in your cupboard or pantry? Fill a small bowl with 1 1/2 cups apple cider vinegar and add a couple of drops of liquid dish detergent. Leave it in there for a week; it will attract the bugs, which will fall into the bowl and drown. Then empty the shelves, and give the interior a thorough washing with dishwashing detergent or 2 cups baking soda in 1 quart (1 liter) water. Discard all wheat products (breads, pasta, flour, and such), and clean off canned goods before putting them back.

#### The Death of Bees - Mysterious Book Report No. 103 John Dwaine McKenna



The novel we're reviewing this week is one of the most talked about this year. After reading it I understand why. It's a mystery that concerns itself not with who did it, but instead with How long can they get away with the crime? It's written by a native of Scotland named Lisa O'Donnell in the form of three, first-person narratives: Marnie, a fifteen year old who's been hardened by the bleakness of her life and situation. She's trying to protect her younger sister, Nelly. Nelly is a twelve or thirteen year old prodigy who plays classical violin like an angel. Her narrative is self-centered and not much concerned with reality, because Nelly is in an Alice in Wonderland state that's sort of denial and sort of if I ignore it, it will go away. The third narrative comes from Lennie, the girls gay next-door neighbor. He's an old man whose narrative is addressed to his dead lover, a man named Joseph.

The Death of Bees (Harper Collins, \$25.99, 309 pages, ISBN 978-0-06-220984-9) by Lisa O'Donnell is a tour de force of creative writing in the English language. Each character speaks to the reader in a clear, distinct and unique voice to tell a part of the tale as no other character could possibly do. Then, like a harmonious trio, the three narratives blend together to tell the story in its entirety.

As the novel begins Marnie and Nelly, two abused and neglected children of drunken, drug-addicted parents, are trying to figure out what to do with the dead and putrefying body of Gene. He's their father. He's been dead for a bit over a week after being smothered by a pil-

low while in a self-induced coma fueled by drugs and alcohol. The darkness of a winter night finds them digging a shallow grave in the backyard garden. After some initial hesitation, they stuff Izzy, their neglectful mother in too. She's been out in the garden shed since hanging herself the same day that Gene died. After the hole is filled in, the girls plant lavender to disguise the grave. All's well at first. The girls tell anyone who asks, "Gene and Izzy have gone to Turkey" on an extended holiday. The ploy works for a little while, but then problems arise; like that pesky dog, always digging in the yard . . . always sniffing around the garden . . . digging. The suspense intensifies with each passing page as more folks; like Mick the drug-selling ice-cream vendor who's missing a whole lot of cash; and Vlad, the sinister thug Mick owes the missing money to. And all the while everyone and everything is being observed by Lennie, the lonely old man next door. If crime-fiction and intelligent murder mysteries are your bag-do not miss The Death of Bees. Lisa O'Donnell writes with intelligent graceful compassion and understanding. Her book is one of the best books this year and will be discussed for a long time to come. It has the hallmarks of a classic; it's unforgettable.

DEP Opens Catskill Lands and Reservoirs for Certified Guided Tours Certified Guides Provide Hunting, Fishing, and Hiking Expertise and will Help Boost Local Economies

New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) Commissioner Carter Strickland announced a new program that will allow New York state-certified outdoor guides to utilize City-owned land and reservoirs in the Catskills for the first time. The program for certified guides underscores DEP's ongoing effort to encourage low-impact recreation on City-owned property in the watersheds that will support the tourism economy in the Catskills. Outdoor guides, long a staple of the Catskills, offer services for hire that include instructing or aiding visitors in fishing, hunting, or hiking.

"Professional guides offer a valuable service for those who are seeking outdoor recreational opportunities in the Catskills," Commissioner Strickland said. "By opening City-owned properties to these outdoor experts, DEP hopes visitors, including New York City residents, will find new places to enjoy the excellent fishing, hunting, and hiking in the sce-

nic watershed."

Outdoor guides that want to offer services on City-owned properties must be certified to do so by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. Among other requirements, the state program requires all guides to be certified in first aid, CPR, and water safety. Guides also must pass a state exam. Guides who are interested in utilizing City-owned land can call DEP at (800) 575-LAND. Visitors interested in choosing a guide may also call that number to ensure a guide is certified to offer tours on City-owned properties. DEP will not charge a fee, but guides will be required to complete an application and provide a copy of their state certification. Seasons for guide services will coincide with state hunting and fishing regulations, and the City's recreational rules.

DEP established the program for guides after consulting with tourism agencies and other partners across the Catskill and Delaware Watersheds. In recent years, the City has sought to boost tourism in the Catskills by establishing a recreational boating program at four of its reservoirs, starting a pilot program to use electric trolling motors for fishing on Cannonsville Reservoir, and opening more than 52,000 acres of land that can be used without a permit for hunting, hiking, and other low impact outdoor activities. Opening those properties for outdoor recreation was among 100 initiatives outlined in Strategy 2011-2014, a comprehensive strategic plan to help ensure DEP is the safest, most efficient, cost-effective, and transparent water utility in the nation. At the same time, DEP has continued a rigorous program of water quality monitoring to ensure that recreation activities do not affect the high quality of the City's drinking water.

DEP manages New York City's water supply, providing more than one billion gallons of water each day to more than 9 million residents, including 8.3 million in New York City, and residents of Ulster, Orange, Putnam, and Westchester counties. This water comes from the Catskill, Delaware, and Croton watersheds that extend more than 125 miles from the City, and the system comprises 19 reser-

voirs, three controlled lakes, and numerous tunnels and aqueducts. DEP employs nearly 6,000 employees, including almost 1,000 scientists, engineers, surveyors, watershed maintainers and others professionals in the upstate watershed. In addition to its \$68 million payroll and \$157 million in annual taxes paid in upstate counties, DEP has invested more than \$1.5 billion in watershed protection programs-including partnership organizations such as the Catskill Watershed Corporation and the Watershed Agricultural Council-that support sustainable farming practices, environmentally sensitive economic development, and local economic opportunity. In addition, DEP has a robust capital program with over \$14 billion in investments planned over the next 10 years that will create up to 3,000 construction-related jobs per year. Bonacic recently met with the head of Foxwoods, which would like to compete for a casino in Liberty. Foxwoods President, Scott Butera informed the Senator that Foxwoods annually spends \$100 million a year with nearby businesses.

Empire Resorts is currently partnering with EPR to re-develop the Concord hotel site, has already spent tens of millions of dollars and is near having all local approvals in place. The Nevele project in Ellenville would pump nearly a half a billion dollars

into Ulster County.

Ulster County Legislator Craig Lopez said, "This creates an opportunity for two casinos in the Catskills, including one at the Nevele. the Nevele can bring can transform Wawarsing. I look forward to working closely with Senator Bonacic in support of the gaming referendum, and then to work in support of the Nevele project."



Republicans had similar difficulty sometimes leaving slots blank or cross-endorsing Democrats.

Chet Flippo, who wrote for several major music publications, including Rolling Stone, Billboard, Texas Monthly, and The New York Times, and served most recently as editorial director of CMT and CMT.com, passed away in Nashville at the age of 69. His first book, Your Cheatin' Heart: A Biography of Hank Williams, remains the definitive bio of the Country Punk Rock n Roll superstar, and was very inspiring to me when I was forming The Brooklyn Cowboys! In fact, The Brooklyn Cowboys got their name when our recording engineer asked me what name to put on the tape reel for our first demos (which, by the way, were recorded in 1996, and fea-tured Larry Campbell on fiddle and steel guitar). With no thought, I blurted out, "The Brooklyn Cowboys", and that

Now, I happened to be reading Chet's Hank bio at the time, and in the millisecond after I said it, my first thought was "Driftin' Cowboys, Brooklyn Cowboys"! Not that I was trying to copy Hank's band name. I did say it came out with no thought involved, but afterwards, this thought affirmed the

name! But I digress. Back to Mister Flippo.

Chet's first article for Rolling Stone was about the vastly underrated Doug Sahm, the Austin based Country Blues RnB rocker who clearly should be in every hall of fame there is! #### CWC awards 22 Education Grants

Twenty-two education grants totaling nearly \$125,000 were recently approved by the Catskill Watershed Corporation (CWC) Board of Directors.

Twenty awards will go to schools and non-profit organizations serving students and their teachers in the Catskills and in New York City. Two more grants were approved under the Special Program Fund for projects to extend Watershed lessons to general and adult audiences.

The intent of both programs is to heighten awareness and understanding of the New York City water system and its vast Watershed West of the Hudson River.

CWC grants are provided in partnership with the New York City Department of Environmental Protection. The Round 16 grants approved at the May 7 CWC board meeting will send students to the Ashokan Center and to Frost Valley YMCA Environmental Education Center for direct experience at the source of the water supply for nine million people. Other grants will support Arm of the Sea Theater and Catskill Tales & Tunes water-related performances, as well as equipment for raising Trout in the Classroom.

Three schools will purchase classroom models to allow them to "see" the impacts of non-point source pollution on surface waters and the way groundwater works.

Sullivan County Cooperative Extension will receive two awards -- a regular education grant to teach stream concepts to county teachers, and a Special Program grant to explain stream management issues to creekside Watershed residents with primary homes in New York City.

Other projects include a second water mural planned for a New York City street by an organization called Groundswell that teaches and employs city youth to produce thematic public art; and a Special Program grant to Olive Free Library to provide water-related theater, music and poetry programs.

Another grant will support an exciting new venture by the NYC-based HarborLab to maintain a fleet of kayaks and canoes on the Neversink Reservoir for use by city students and their Watershed peers in conjunction with lessons about water quality and environmental protection.

Other recipients of CWC Education Grants this year include, from the Watershed: Walton and Franklin Central Schools, Phoenicia Elementary School, and Woodstock Day School.

New York City-based recipients are Friends of PS 166, Rocking the Boat, PS 11, PS 144Q, Eltingville Lutheran School, Columbia Secondary School, Brooklyn School of Inquiry, IN-Tech Academy, Earth School, PTA of the Neighborhood School and Family Life Academy Charter School. (Contd. Pg. 14)







New York Lawmakers Pass Critical Legislation On Invasive Wild Pigs

Importing, possessing, selling or releasing wild pigs would be illegal in New York under a bill that now awaits Gov. Andrew Cuomo's signature. The measure, which covers non-native Eurasian boar, wild pigs and their hybrids, would ban high-fenced shooting preserves and breeders from stocking these animals. Violators would be fined \$500 to more than \$1,000.

A.3767/S.5733, sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick, D-New York, and Sen. Betty Little, R-Queensbury, passed the House with a 136-5 vote and the Senate with a 62-1 vote.

Brian Shapiro, New York state director for The Humane Society of the United States said: "For too long, these invasive species have been escaping fenced enclosures and wreaking havoc on our environment. We are grateful to our sponsors and the legislature for recognizing the importance of protecting our native wildlife and livestock and strongly urge Governor Cuomo to sign this critical legislation right away."

The New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and United States Department of Agriculture actively pursued this vital legislation and conducted educational campaigns across the state, which greatly aided in its

passage.

Also known as wild pigs or feral swine, Eurasian boars are notorious for escaping their fenced enclosures, and establishing breeding populations throughout New York. Eurasian boar can spread diseases to native wildlife populations and livestock, threatening the agriculture industry. The rooting behavior of wild pigs can also damage sensitive ecosystems and farmland. The animals have been found in 38 states around the country, and eradication efforts through hunting have been largely unsuccessful.

Facts:

 The USDA estimates that feral pigs inflict more than one billion dollars in damages every year.

-Wild pigs can spread diseases such as pseudorabies and brucellosis, which threaten domestic livestock populations.

-Vermont Gov. Peter Shumlin signed a bill June 7, 2013 that would prohibit the importation and possession of wild pigs. Michigan and Kansas also recently took action to prohibit captive hunting of wild pigs.

-Eurasian boars are often bred for captive shoots, where they are stocked inside fenced enclosures for hunting targets.



NYS Senate Passes Legislation to Restore \$90 Million to Office for People with Developmental Disabilities

The New York State Senate has passed legislation (S.4777D) that will restore up to \$90 million to the Office for People with Developmental Disabilities (OPWDD). This funding helps nonprofit programs who provide services and opportunities for some of New York's most vulnerable people.

This year, the Governor's office proposed \$240 million in state and federal cuts to OPWDD funding. The legislature worked to restore \$60 million of those cuts in the 2013-2014 New York State Budget. However, this restoration fell short of what was needed.

"Despite the restoration of \$60 million in funding to OPWDD in the budget, there was still a 4.5 percent cut totaling \$90 million. This bill finally closes that gap and gives programs for the developmentally disabled the necessary funding they need to keep doing the good work they do," said Senator Bonacic.

The legislation passed both the Senate and Assembly unanimously this week. The bill now will be sent to the Governor's office to be signed into law.

Schumer, Gillibrand Announce over \$200,000 in Federal Funds to Bolster Food Hub, Create Jobs in SC Funds will be used to Cultivate, Distribute Local Farm Goods across the State and Create Nearly 20 Jobs

U.S. Senators Charles E. Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand today announced \$213,400 for the Sullivan County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) to launch a satellite Food Distribution Hub Project, providing Sullivan Country farmers an effective distribution line to move their goods to local and regional markets, an effort that is expected to create up to 19 new local jobs. The federal funding is allocated through the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Rural Business Enterprise Grant Program.

In a letter to U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Tom Vilsack, Senator Gillibrand personally advocated for Sullivan County's effort to strengthen the local agriculture industry.

"Stores, markets, and restaurants throughout the Hudson Valley-and-beyond should be filled with Sullivan County's locally-grown products," said Senator Schumer. "With the Sullivan County Industrial Development Agency leading the way, and the USDA funding behind them, the Food Distribution Hub Project will grow the partnership between local organizations and community farmers, and serve as an economic boost to the region, all while providing delicious, high-quality food."

"Connecting more of our local farms with local markets is good for business, and good for the health of our families," said Senator Gillibrand, the first New York Senator to serve on the Senate Agriculture Committee in four decades and a leading advocate for developing food hubs. "Farms of the Hudson Valley are growing some of the highest quality produce. And when we help these farms reach new markets in the region, we can connect families, businesses and schools with food that's grown right in our community, and help strengthen the local economy."

"We are very pleased and excited to receive this Rural Business Enterprise Grant from the USDA to support Sullivan County's farms and agricultural community," said Ira Steingart, Chairman of the Sullivan County Industrial Development Agency and Sullivan County Legislator. "The funding will be used to create a local food hub in Sullivan County that will provide much needed marketing support to farms throughout the region. This grant will help boost the economy of Sullivan County."

"Developing solutions for gaps in our local foods distribution is a critical step which can support our regional food systems and ensure that our farm families can make a living as viable partners in a sustainable economic future," Executive Director of Hudson Valley AgriBusiness Development Corp., Todd M. Erling said. "HVADC appreciates the collaborative efforts of local businesses, the Sullivan County IDA, Ginsberg's Foods and the USDA programs in creating long-lasting opportunities to expand the available farm products in the Hudson Valley."

"We could not be more thrilled with the award of this grant for our local food hub/distribution project in Sullivan County and the Mid-Hudson Region. The idea of providing the pick-up and delivery for our local providers and connecting them directly with end users with the subsequent ability to distribute regionally is a huge win for all," said Sullivan County Legislature Chairman Scott Samuelson. "The agricultural community is such an important part of our economic future and anything we can do to help our farmers sell and distribute their products is a positive step forward. We want to thank all parties involved that helped make the application such a success and are very grateful to Senator Gillibrand for her always constant support of Sullivan County, our residents and the Mid-Hudson Region."

The Sullivan County IDA will specifically use the federal funds to launch a satellite Food Distribution Hub Project that will help enable farmers and food producers in the Sullivan-Wawarsing REAP Zone to efficiently access thriving local and regional markets. The IDA will develop a centrally located aggregation and distribution facility to meet demand for Less Than Trailer Load (LTL) freight service, enabling transactions between farmers and wholesale buyers within the county while also opening up local producers to the larger Hudson Valley and New York City markets.

Senator Gillibrand was successful in securing the reauthorization of Rural Economic Area Partnership (REAP) designation for the Sullivan-Wawarsing Zone in the recently-passed Senate Farm Bill. The measure would extend a designation that helps give the region priority access to federal funding from the USDA to help grow the local economy and revitalize rural communities. The current Sullivan-Wawarsing REAP Zone designation expires September 30, 2013. Senator Gillibrand's measure would extend the designation another five years. After clearing final passage in the Senate, the legislation now awaits passage by the House of Representatives.

Assembly passes Safe Patient Handling Act Albany, NY – Assemblywoman Aileen Gunther today announced Assembly passage of the Safe Patient Handling Act. The measure calls for health care facilities to develop a Safe Patient Handling policy – protecting patients, health care workers and, in the long term, reduc-

ing costs for health care facilities.

The bill (A.2180-B), carried by Assemblywoman Gunther, creates a statewide Safe Patient Handling Task Force to develop recommendations for policies in hospitals, nursing homes, and other healthcare facilities.

Each facility would then create a Safe Patient Handling committee to develop and implement a facility appropriate policy.

"This bill has been a long time coming," said Gunther. 
"Today, we've taken a huge step forward for the nursing profession and improved the delivery of healthcare in New York. Demonstration programs around the state have been extremely successful. In three years, one hospital saw a 76 percent reduction in Worker' Compensation claims and another decreased lost days due to injury by 95.8 percent."

Safe patient handling provides training and, in some cases, can replace manual lifting and moving tasks with assistive devices to properly and safely transfer patients without injury to the patient or the health care worker.

While a safe patient handling program may require an initial capital investment, healthcare facilities were able to quickly recoup their costs through decreased Worker's Compensation claims, a reduction in staff time to review and act on injury reports, and, ultimately, a decrease in Worker's Compensation premiums.

51 of 57 counties across New York State have filed similar Home Rule requests in the Senate and the Assembly for an extension of their sales tax. Ulster County currently has active companion bills in the Assembly and the Senate, A5130 (sponsored by Assemblyman Skartados) and S4516 (cosponsored by Senator Larkin and Senator Tkaczyk). On April 16th and again on June 18th, Ulster County unanimously passed bi-partisan resolutions supporting these critical bills.

Ulster County has a 4% sales tax rate which is continued through Home Rule legislation passed by the New York State Legislature every 2 years. Since 1993, this legislation has been routinely passed by the New York State Legislature.

This dangerous game being played by Assemblyman Cahill may result in the loss of \$22,000,000 in annual sales tax revenue for Ulster County, and \$3,031,060 for the City of Kingston. A loss of this magnitude would result in a 29% property tax increase for the County property taxpayers and a 20% property tax increase for the City of Kingston or massive cuts to services. Additionally, the towns would lose \$790,712 in sales tax revenue.

"I first want to thank Senators Larkin and Tkaczyk and Assemblyman Skartados for their bi-partisan support of the County's Home Rule request," said Ulster County Executive Mike Hein. "It is unconscionable that an individual member of the State Assembly would be able to block a local Home Rule measure that will have unimaginable negative consequences for the taxpayers he represents."

"Passing the sales tax extension before the end of the State legislative session is critical to our fiscal solvency," said Comptroller Elliot Auerbach. "In this difficult economic environment, failure of the State Legislature to extend our sales tax rate would have a devastating impact and would likely result in substantial property tax increases and service cuts to cover the revenue shortfall."

"The taxpayers of the City of Kingston cannot and should not stand for this reckless endangerment of our welfare," said City of Kingston Mayor Shayne Gallo . "Assemblyman Cahill is putting the people, the employees and the services of the City of Kingston at risk,"

"If the Assembly chooses not to act on this routine extension, the financial fall-out will have a devastating effect on the economy of Ulster County and have negative impacts across the region," said Ulster County Legislator Rich Gerentine. "I urge the Assembly to do the right thing for Ulster County taxpayers."

"The 1% sales tax extension brings in a significant amount of revenue to our local municipalities and takes the burden off of our local property taxpayers," said Legislator Hector S. Rodriguez" "To hold local taxpayers hostage is simply unacceptable and the Assemblyman should stop playing politics with peoples lives."

"State lawmakers who use this practice of blocking local sales tax bills do a disservice to their constituents and county government partners," said NYSAC Executive Director Stephen J. Acquario. "In a climate where counties are struggling to survive under the crushing burden of State mandates these actions only add insult to injury."

What he's trying to do is extort us for a takeover of election cost or a takeover of Safety Net or both," said county Legislator Kenneth Ronk. "Kevin Cahill is trying, as a New York State assemblyman, to dictate fiscal policy to County government and that is simply unacceptable."

"It is disturbing," said Ulster County Legislator Jeanette Provenzano. "Ulster County is the only one having problems with a representative who refuses to support its homerule request. That's outrageous. It's unacceptable."

"This is a bipartisan plea from the leaders in Ulster County: do the right thing for Ulster County," said Legislator Wayne Harris. "We spend a great deal of energy trying to attract tourists to Ulster County. This generates sales tax and allows us to keep our property taxes in line."



I am Mad as Hell for the Graduates of 2013! I live in the country, the rural area of New York, and have attended several graduation parties. Parties for smart, ambitious, multi-talented, cultured and outstanding athletic students - all with high averages.

And most all of them and their fellow graduates are planning to attend local State University of New York (SUNY) Colleges or second rate colleges below their intellectual abilities. I think their high SAT scores, dreams and challenges indicate they should be given the opportunity for greater educational challenges. (This is not to criticize SUNY Schools.)

Why? Because their ordinary middle class hard-working family can't afford the money to pay today's increased tuition. (This includes families with misfortunes.) Also, because it is downright stupid and crazy to take out a student loan or a family bank loan or mortgage which they can never, if ever, pay back.

The attitude, and common sense philosophy of middle and lower class families is: "Let's go to a cheaper, local school for two years, and then we'll see what happens." At least our graduate won't be burdened with a \$40,000.00 debt without a prospective good job, a big outstanding loan, lousy credit, inability to financially get married, have children, obtain a mortgage to buy a home, and have a lien against their income tax refunds.

Would it be better to join the army for an education and risk getting killed?

This is not what I and my parents got sick worrying about years ago when I graduated high school, college and professional graduate school.

What are those high falutin' commencement speakers talking to the graduates about? : "Don't get discouraged - get up and fight!" ?

Why are we spending billions of dollars on foreign wars, military products, foreign aid to win friends and influence, and for utter political bull?

As every foreigner who immigrated or escaped to America in the 1910s, 1920s, 1930s and 1940s, most of which couldn't speak much English, knew, our only chance, wealth and future legacy was our newborn children's education and opportunity.

They, and the educational core of New York and others, need help and assistance NOW!

One solution would be to either forgive outstanding student loans, or have the government assume student related loans, or at least, cut them some slack.


