

A Round About Tri-Valley

Condolences to the family and friends of Timothy O'Sullivan of Grahamsville. Timothy passed away on February 20th at the age of 36.

Get well wishes to Charlotte Stratton who was hospitalized for a short time but is now at her home on South Hill.

Congratulations to Taylor Pavese and Michael Schulte two alpine skiers from Tri-Valley, who qualified for the NYS Ski Championships at Bristol Mountain.

Spring-like weather has made its long-awaited return and the maple sugarhouses are in full swing. Several of our local sugarhouses will be demonstrating the maple sugaring process from tapping trees to sugaring off. Visits to Frost Valley (March 18-26), Justice Asthalter Maple Syrup (March 18-26) and The Catskill Mountain Sugar House on Glade Hill on March 25th and 26th will demonstrate the art of syrup making. John Garigliano, owner of the Catskill Mountain Sugar House represents a sizable NYS maple syrup operation with about 62,000 taps. John started boiling sap in mid January and made 40 barrels of syrup at that time. As long as the trees don't start to bud, sap should flow into April. At Furman Farms, we still make some syrup by tapping the maples in our sugarbush lot. Of course we tap the trees the old -fashioned way, by hanging buckets on the trees (not with tubing) and collecting the sap each morning and evening. Pete does the collecting in the morning and the grandkids (now 12,10, and almost 8) help with the collection after school. We don't sell syrup, however the Furman Family enjoys eating the syrup we do make on our pancakes each morning. Maple sap usually flows when daytime temperatures stay 40 degrees or warmer and nighttime temperatures dip below freezing.

At the end of the late Evelyn Huntsberger's poem TIME TO TAP written in 1965, are these words: "So let's go out and tap the maples! Get out the sil-

ver spiles and buckets, clean the sap arch, gather wood; Get the sap pan ready The clear sap is free to run

again. Winter's stepping out the door. Come on, let's welcome in the spring!

Some spring things you can do: Force some forsythia, check your pussy willows, clean-out your bird houses and check them for leaks, mend your fences, wash your windows, wash and vacuum out your car, and just sit back and enjoy the warm sunshine.

Words of Wisdom: Hold your wife's hand in the mall, because if you let it go she'll start shopping. It looks romantic, but it's actually economic.

Don't be afraid to encounter risks. It is by taking chances that we learn how to be brave.

Local Resident Target of Phone Scam

Several "Grandparent Scam" phone calls have been received by a local resident in Sundown.

Typically, this scam comes in the form of an urgent phone call. The caller claims to be "your favorite grandson" or just says "it's me"... prompting the grandparent to supply the needed name. While the emergencies vary, the scenario is usually this: The "grandson" is out of town and needs money fast -- to make bail, or to pay for automobile repairs or medical expenses. The caller begs the grandparent not to tell his parents, just wire the money immediately. Scammers know that parents and grandparents fear a call that tells them their loved one is in trouble. Each year, thousands of Americans get caught in the Grandparent Scam. Increasingly, scammers use actual relatives' names and information gleaned from social media and other internet sites.

In this case, the recipient was aware that the calls were scams and would not give any information, other than telling the caller to call his mother and ask her for help.

The victim of the calls did call the NYS Attorney General's office to file a complaint. She also proceeded to call the NYS Police in her area. Within hours, a State Police officer was at her home taking information and assisting her.

While it is still advisable to report these incidents to the NYS Attorney General's office (1-800-771-7755) it is also advisable to also call the State

Police in your jurisdiction for prompt attention.

Other scams aimed at senior citizens are:

Jury Duty Scam - The caller will claim to be an officer of the court and say there's a warrant for the arrest of the victim for failing to report for jury duty. The scammer will also claim that there is a fine for failing to show up for jury duty, and that unless the fine is paid immediately, the police will be sent to the victim's

home to make an arrest. The scammer will request that the "Jury Duty Warrant" be paid with a Green Dot Card Money Card or Western Union Money Gram. The scam has been around for years and surfaces periodically in New York. In one recent case, the calls were traced to a Georgia prison.

Lottery Scam - The caller says you've won a foreign lottery and requests that you, as the "winner," send a check or to wire money to cover taxes and fees. Legitimate contests never ask for money upfront. The caller may request your banking information in order to electronically direct deposit your winnings. This is an attempt to steal your identity and will wipe out your bank account.

The callers often use a name that sounds like a government agency or official-sounding authority. The name can be invented, like the "National Sweepstakes Bureau," or "The National Consumer Protection Agency." Sometimes they will use an actual name of a government agency, like the Federal Trade Commission. The scammers claim that the government "oversees" the integrity of foreign lotteries. This is a scam. Red-winged Blackbird Harbinger of Spring

A sighting of a flock of Red-wing blackbirds in the Claryville area was reported by Denning Town Clerk, Joy Monforte on Wednesday, February 22. I also heard later that day that some Red-wing blackbirds had wintered over near Ellenville.

To us, the return of the Red-winged Blackbirds is a harbinger of spring, but to the male Red-wing blackbird, their early return is actually more about real

Despite life or death situations, if faced with cold snaps or late winter snowfalls, to the male Red-winged blackbird, it's worth it -evolutionarily speaking. Males who manage to find and hang on to a territory while staying in top breeding condition until the females arrive some weeks later win the breeding sweepstakes!

Red-winged Blackbirds are polygynous, with territorial males defending up to 10 females. Females who



look completely different than the male Red-winged blackbirds, frequently copulate with males other than their social mate and often lay clutches of mixed paternity. Pairs raise two or three clutches per season, in a new nest for each

A clutch consists of three or four, and rarely five, eggs. Eggs are oval, smooth and slightly glossy, and measure about .7 - 1 in. They are pale bluish green, marked with brown, purple, and/or black, with most markings around the larger end of the egg. The eggs are incubated by the female alone, and hatch in 11 to 12 days.

Red-winged Blackbirds are blind and without feathers when hatched, and are ready to leave the nest 11-14 days after hatching.

The male birds are quite busy during this time gathering and bringing food to all his offspring. That could be as many as 30 to 50 hungry baby birds!

The common name for the Red-winged Blackbird is taken mainly from the adult male's distinctive red shoulder patches called "epaulets", which are visible when the male bird is flying. The glossy-black males can puff up or hide their scarlet-and-yellow shoulder patches depending on how confident they feel.

Red-winged blackbirds are a highly social species, and spend much of their lives in flocks, even during breeding season. The males gather to forage together in neutral territory. In order to do this without antagonizing each other, they temporarily hide those showy red patches by moving their feathers to cover the red. Studies show how important the red epaulets are to establish dominance. When researchers blackened out a male's red patches, he often lost his territory to another male.

Male and female red-wings look completely different. The females are more subdued and have a muted coloring, with brown streaks overall, that are paler on the breast and often have whitish eyebrows. Females remain low as they lurk through vegetation for food or quietly weave their remarkable nests together.

Red-winged Blackbirds aggressively defend their territory from other animals and frequently attack much larger birds. Males have been known to swoop at humans who encroach upon their nesting territory

during breeding season.

Group nesting is a trait that reduces the risk of individual aftacks from preying enemies by increasing the number of alert parents. Their nests offer a strategic advantage over predators in that they are often well concealed in thick, waterside reeds and positioned at a height of one to two and a half yards. Males often act as guards, using a variety of calls to denote the kind and severity of danger. Mobbing, especially by males, is also used to scare off unwanted predators.

The Red-winged Blackbird is omnivorous meaning they feed primarily on plant materials, including seeds from weeds and waste grain such as corn and rice. Approximately a quarter of their diet consists of insects and other small animals, especially during

breeding season.

If you wish to attract Red-winged blackbirds to your back yard, they will be lured to your feeders with bread, seed mixtures and suet.

Whether the Red-winged Blackbirds that were sighted are those that wintered over, or those who have returned to find their prime piece of Catskill Mountain real estate and despite the winter chill that is back in the air - the song of the Red-winged Blackbird still suggests spring is near!





IRS Scam - The caller will claim to be an agent or police officer from the Internal Revenue Service calling about a past due tax balance that is owed. The caller will tell the victim that unless the debt is paid immediately, a team of officers will come to the victim's home that day to arrest the victim. The scammer will also request that the "IRS Tax Warrant" be paid with a Green Dot Card Money Card or Western Union MoneyGram. These scammers often use caller ID spoofing so that the victim's caller ID box says "Internal Revenue Service" or displays the phone number of the Internal Revenue Service.

Utility Scam - The caller claims to be a representative of a local utility provider. In some cases, the scammer has the victim's correct account number. The scammer will then advise the resident that the utility bill is past due and must be paid immediately to avoid termination of service. The scammer will also request that the delinquent bill be paid with a Green Dot Card Money Card or Western Union MoneyGram. Suspects committing this scam have often obtained personal information via the internet, Facebook, Instagram or other social media.

Tips For Seniors to Avoid Falling Victim:

Think Of The Telephone As A "One Way Street" It's okay to give out information over the phone if you made the call to a number you know and trust (such as your own bank). However, never give out personal information when you receive an unsolicited call. If you receive a call soliciting personal information, just hang up the phone, no matter what the caller ID says. If the caller says he's from your bank and is checking on possible unauthorized withdrawals from your account, hang up the phone and then call your bank. If it was your bank that was trying to call, then it will be happy to confirm the call and will often provide requests to you in writing. If your bank says it wasn't trying to reach you, that

means the caller you hung up on was a scammer. Beware If A Caller Ask To Keep A Conversation A Secret

A legitimate caller will never request that a conversation remain a secret, and you should immediately be suspicious. Whether the caller claims to be from the government, a bank, or a family member, requests for confidentiality should raise a red flag. Just Sav No!

You don't have to be polite when you receive unsolicited phone calls. The safest thing to do is to say "no" and hang up. Legitimate callers will typically also provide requests in writing. It is better to be guarded than to fall victim.

Remember the old adage: "If it sounds too good to be true, it probably is." Be wary of any offers or deals that sound too good to be true, as they likely

are too good to be true.

Attorney General Schneiderman reminds New Yorkers that in addition to being vigilant consumers, take immediate steps if you receive a 'scam call'. Call the NYS Police in your area. Also report instances of fraud to the NY Attorney General's office and file a complaint at 1-800-771-7755.





THE BUDGET BALANCING ACT Relying on "Savings" To Support Expenses

Kingston, NY (February 21, 2017) - The piggy bank of Ulster County government has been cracked open in an attempt to balance the 2017 County Budget. A \$16 million revenue shortfall has been projected as a result of liberally identifying expenses, as well as uncertainty in revenue streams other than sales and property taxes. This year's deficit variance has been filled through a fund balance appropriation.

Further conclusions indicated:

Consistent over budgeting of revenues, including actual revenue shortfalls in four out of the last five years (2011-15);

Consistent over budgeting of expenditures over the last five years at an average amount of \$17.43

million per year (2011-15); and

Consistent over budgeting of salaries by including unfilled and vacant positions, creating a budget cushion of approximately \$2 million per year

The Office of the Ulster County Comptroller's 2016 4th Quarter Report on "Budgeting Revenues and Expenditures" concludes that a multi-year budget would "afford the County Legislature an extended view of the projected fund balance over time, while also providing an outlook on how the County intends to retain its fiscal strength and create safeguards from significant tax increase." Additionally, the Report supports ongoing Legislative approval and oversight in post budget appropriations by way of increased contingency fund appropriations - in lieu of consistently over

budgeting expenditures.

In honor of St. Patrick's Day, « Concert at the Barn » series at the International Center for a Culture of Compassion in Woodbourne, NY, will feature a performance by Eric Banger and the Mashers on Sunday, March 12, 2017 at 3 pm, who will lead us on a pilgrimage through the history and music of the Irish Diaspora.





Weekly Legislative Recap from Congressman Faso

On Affordable Care Act reform and other important issues, the most effective way for a representative to advocate on behalf of his constituents is to meet one on one or in small groups.

This week I was proud to cosponsor two pieces of healthcare legislation: one ensures individuals with pre-existing conditions are not discriminated against when seeking health insurance; the other bill helps small businesses offer more affordable insurance options to their employees.

I have long stated that we must preserve the provisions of the Affordable Care Act that work. One of these provisions is protection for patients with pre-existing conditions. This week I became a cosponsor of H.R. 1121, the Pre-existing Conditions Protection Act, which prohibits health insurance companies from discriminating against individuals with pre-existing conditions. This means that insurance companies would be barred from denying coverage or charging individuals with pre-existing conditions higher premiums. If enacted, this legislation would take effect in the case of a pre-existing conditions provision repeal.

I also became a cosponsor of H.R. 1101, the Small Business Health Fairness Act of 2017. This bill would allow small businesses to join together in association health plans, giving them the power to negotiate lower healthcare costs for their employees. If enacted, the Small Business Health Fairness

Act would:

Increase small businesses' bargaining power with insurance providers and put them on a more level playing field with larger companies and unions.

Expand affordable coverage for working families who want to purchase health insurance through

their employer.

Lower administrative costs for small businesses who face limited resources and want to provide health insurance to their employees.

FY 2018 Executive Budget Updates **Bureaucratic Laws to Allow Charitable** Organizations to Raise More Funds Through Raffles, Other Games

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo today announced a proposal to modernize laws to make it easier for charitable organizations to raise funds through gaming, including raffles, bell jar and other types of games. This proposal, part of the FY 2018 Executive Budget, will help veterans' organizations such as The Veterans of Foreign Wars, The American Legion and Disabled American Veterans; fraternal and service organizations including the Loyal Order of Moose, Fraternal Order of Eagles, and the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks; and hundreds of churches, volunteer fire departments and other non-profits across the state raise funds for their organizations.

"For too long, red tape and outdated laws on the books have inhibited the efforts of well-intentioned charities to raise crucial funds in support of their good work," Governor Cuomo said. "These reforms will modernize our laws, remove burdensome obstacles and allow non-profits to raise more funds from generous New Yorkers to support important causes that improve our communities, protect our environment and help save

Due to outdated statutes, restrictions and antiquated reporting requirements, these groups have been unable to fully capitalize on charitable fundraising, therefore leaving worthwhile causes underfunded. Governor Cuomo's measures revamp the many archaic charitable gaming laws to give organizations more flexibility and removes bureaucracy when seeking to raise funds for their charitable purposes.

The proposal consolidates a number of charitable gaming statutes from various sections of law, removing duplicative language to create a single set of laws. Governor Cuomo's proposal includes:

Allowing charitable organizations to sell raffle tickets and conduct games of chance through use of checks, credit and debit cards

Permitting charitable organizations to conduct

games in additional locations (beyond their own, municipal-owned or other charitable organization properties) and make it easier for organizations to get approval for off-site games

Reducing the number of years that a charitable organization must be in existence from three to one in order to conduct games of chance, in line with the current requirement for bingo operators

Moving charitable gaming forms and applications online to minimize paperwork for charitable organizations and municipalities

Lessening restrictions on charitable gaming advertising to include online and off-premise ads

 Formally permitting charitable organizations to conduct gaming on Sundays and remove restricted

hours for certain games

 Increasing the prize limitations for bell jar from \$500 to \$1,000 (maximum aggregate prizes from \$3,000 to \$6,000) and bingo from \$1,000 to \$5,000 (maximum aggregate prizes from \$3,000 to \$15,000)

Eliminating one of three categories of raffles, thereby simplifying compliance for charitable

organizations.

Permitting alcoholic beverages to be included as

prizes for charitable gaming

Providing flexibility for fee-setting by transferring such provisions from statute to the Gaming Commission regulations

In the coming months, the New York State Gaming Commission will conduct public hearings across the state to gather input from charitable organizations on any additional improvements to New York charitable gaming laws and regulations.

Governor Cuomo Announces \$8 million for Upgrades at Belleayre Ski Resort -

Funding will Support the Construction of a New Gondola and Upgrades to the Base Lodge at Belleayre Mountain • Expansion Will Allow for More Trails, and Year-Round Recreational

Opportunities

Governor Andrew M. Cuomo announced the state will invest an additional \$8 million for upgrades at Belleayre Ski Center in Highmount to attract more visitors and build on the Catskill Region's burgeoning tourism industry. The investment will enhance the current facilities at Belleayre Mountain with the installation of a new, high-speed gondola, multiple lodge expansions and the addition of modern amenities for both lodges at the resort. The project will increase visitation, enhance customer experience and provide a major boost to tourism in the Catskills and the region's economy.

"Belleayre Mountain is one of the crown jewels of the Catskills and a major driver of the region's tourism economy," Governor Cuomo said. "With this investment, we are supporting vital upgrades at this mountain to ensure it remains an unparalleled year-round recreation destination and continues to leverage economic growth for the entire region for generations to come."

"This plan will overhaul the Belleayre Ski Resort to address areas of need, increase visitation and overall enhance customer satisfaction," said ORDA President & CEO Ted Blazer. "The additions of the new gondola, and modern day lodge amenities at Belleayre will attract new skiers and riders and encourage them to stay in the New York area for their resort experience. I would like to thank the Governor for his continued commitment to not only Belleayre, but to the Catskill Region."

The FY 2018 Executive Budget includes \$12.5 million for Olympic Regional Development Authority facilities, which includes Belleayre, Whiteface and Gore Mountains, as well as Olympic facilities. Last month, the Governor announced an additional \$20 million to upgrade the facilities at Whiteface and Gore Mountains in the North Country and build on the region's burgeoning tourism industry. These new capital investments are being added to the Executive Budget as part of the 30-

day amendments, submitted today. New High-Speed Gondola

Upgrades at Belleayre Mountain include the construction of a high-speed, eight-person gondola that will span from the lower mountain Discovery Lodge to the mountain summit, providing more efficient, logical, and necessary access point to skiers and riders. The installation of this lift, along with other proposed changes, would overhaul the entire facility and elevate Belleayre to a higher level of resort experience. The new gondola will include 65 cabins that will transport guests to the summit in under six minutes, massively increasing the skier capacity of the mountain and providing for a better ski experience. The Gondola would also provide additional revenue opportunities as the use of indoor cabins allows for the following offerings:

Nordic and Cross Country skiing at the expansive

summit of the mountain;

 Year-round scenic gondola rides as sold at Whiteface & Gore Mountains;

Mountain biking from the mountain summit; and

 Wedding and private party rentals at mountain summit.

Belleayre Lodge Improvements

The mountain has two primary lodges, the Discovery Lodge at the lower base area lodge that services beginner terrain and rental facilities, and the Overlook Lodge, which accesses the upper mountain offerings

and handles the majority of food and beverage offerings. With the addition of a Gondola, expanding lodge offerings is critical to sustaining the additional guest base expected as a result. The state will provide \$1.5 million for upgrades at each of the lodges.

 Discovery Lodge Improvements: The Discovery Lodge at Belleayre contains a children's learning area, ski school areas, cafeteria, bathrooms, and a small bar/café. Improvements to the Discovery Lodge will increase its current seating capacity, retail space, increased food/beverage locations, and addition of office space. This would provide enough space to have a fully functioning learning area for all ages with the necessary amenities to service these guests as needed including bar and restaurant style offerings.

 Overlook Lodge Improvements: The Overlook Lodge currently provides guest access and gathering at the lift points reaching upper mountain, and contains a cafeteria area as well as a bar and restaurant with an attached deck. Improvements in this area will expand increase seating capacity, storage and locker areas, daycare facilities, and expansion

of food and beverage offerings.

Improvements at Belleayre Mountain will support the facility's role as a major driver of the Catskill Region's tourism industry and will ultimately expand economic growth and investment opportunities for the surrounding communities. It will also make unparalleled skiing and winter recreation opportunities more accessible to visitors from New York City and downstate regions closer than other skiing locations throughout the northeast.

Tourism in the Catskill Region

Since taking office, the Governor has worked to grow New York's tourism industry in the Catskills region. Last year, the Governor hosted the Catskills Summer Challenge to highlight the world-class attractions and activities readily available in the Catskills with the goal of driving tourism and boosting the region's economy.

In 2015, the total economic impact of tourism industry in the region reached \$1.83 billion, an increase of more than 13 percent since 2010. Visitation is up 14 percent since 2010 with more than 11 million visitors to the Catskills in 2015. In addition, tourism is vital to the region's economy, representing more than 15 percent of the region's employment, or over 17,000 jobs.

The investment at Belleayre Mountain builds on the Governor's accomplishments that are already setting the stage for future growth in the Catskills

region, including: Over \$5.4 million invested in the Catskills region by DEC to improve fishing access, hiking trails,

campgrounds and infrastructure;

 The Maurice D. Hinchey Catskill Interpretive Center, a \$1.3 million project supported by New York Works, which was completed in 2015 and provides information to visitors about the 700,000-acre

 Improvements to enhance the experience of visitors and increase public safety, including an obser-vation platform, completed at Kaaterskill Falls; and

 The I LOVE NEW YORK Bus hosts regular ski trips from Manhattan to Catskills' slopes, including Hunter Mountain and Belleayre, to drive tourism Upstate.

The grant program will provide funding for additional security training needs, cameras and state-of-the-art technology, door-hardening, improved lighting and other related security upgrades. The Governor made the announcement following a roundtable with over 50 religious leaders from across the state, including members representing the Christian, Jewish and Muslim faiths.

At the Governor's direction, the state will also expand its toll-free hotline to include text message capability to report incidents of bias and discrimination. A \$5,000 reward is also being made available for any information leading to an arrest and

conviction for a hate crime.




