Rabbit Royalty in Sullivan County
On April 27, 2017, two local 4-H kids from the Town of Neversink, traveled to Springfield, Ohio for The National Dutch Rabbit Show. This show has the biggest gathering of Dutch Rabbits under one roof. The show had over 1250 rabbits shown by 120 exhibitors.

This national show holds contests for the youth members to compete and show their knowledge in the rabbit industry on Friday afternoon. One of the competitions is known as the Dutch Royalty contest. In this contest, the youth members have to write out a written application/essay, do a face to face interview, judge 2 classes of rabbits based on the standard of perfection, perform showmanship, and complete a written test. With the kids all neatly dressed in their white show coats and professional attire, Rebecca Coombe competed in the Duchess division, while fellow rabbit friend, Alexander Ucie-chowski competed in the Prince division. The divisions are based on age groups. After a grueling 3 I/2 hours, they were finally able to relax, but it would be 24 hours until they find out how they did.

breed show. Both kids had some top 10 finishes. At the awards banquet Saturday night, the children got their awards. 

Then Enchantment of Witch Hazel

This time of the year you will see the little whitish blossoms of the Witch Hazel shrub.

Witch Hazel grows in the Catskills along side of other shrubs or small trees, or underneath oaks, hickories, Red Maples, American Beech and even pine



It will usually grow between 9 and 26 feet tall. The leaves are alternately arranged, and oval-

shaped. They measure from 1 1/2" up to 6 " long and are between 1" to 4 1/2 " wide, with a smoothe or wavy edge.

They have fragrant yellow blooms. Each flower has four slender strap-shaped petals a little less than an inch long. They are pale to dark yel-



low, orange, or red. The fruit is a two-part capsule that is less than _ inch long. Each part of the seed pod contains one glossy black seed. When mature, during autumn, the seed pod explodes ejecting the seeds with enough force to fly a distance up to 33 feet!

Witch Hazel is a member of the Hamanelidacease family and is closely related to the sweet gum. Although Witch Hazel has many common names, the generic name means "together with fruit," which refers to the fact that this special tree is the only tree in North America to have flowers, ripe fruit and next year's leaf buds on its branches at the same time.

The Witch Hazel bush is often called water-witch as its branches were once used to search and find underground sources of water and minerals.

The leaves and bark of the North American Witch Hazel has been used to produce an astringent also referred to as witch hazel, and is used medicinally. This plant extract was widely used for medicinal purposes by Native Americans and is still a component of a variety of commercial healthcare products commonly used to treat insect bites, sunburn and as a refreshing after shave lotion.

Through the years the American Witch Hazel has gained a reputation as one of those plants that would like to have everyone's undivided attention. You could say it is a bit of a rebel, marching to the beat of its own drum. It is a native shrub that is unwilling to heed to convention or a single predictable rule.

The name Witch in Witch Hazel supposedly has its roots in Middle English coming from the word wiche. In Old English wice meant "pliant" or "bendable". "Witch hazel" was used in England as a synonym for Wych Elm and it seems that the American colonists simply extended the familiar name to this North American shrub. The use of its twigs as divining rods, just as Hazel twigs were used in England, may also have influenced the "witch" part of the name.

Lightly speaking and referring to the little black seeds - anything that is that small, black and can fly 33 feet is a bit bewitching!

Mysterious Book Report No. 286

Some writers have such a firm understanding of their sense of place and are able to write about it with such authenticity, that the reader is transported there in mind as she or he processes the printed words . . . almost seeing, hearing, and touch-

ing the people, places and events of the story as it unfolds. This weeks MBR number 286 features such an author, who speaks and writes so genuinely of his home in small town Mississippi that readers everywhere will almost feel as if they were born and brought up there.

Desparation Road, (Lee Boudreaux Books/Little Brown and Company, \$26.00, 287 pages, ISBN 978-0-316-35303-8) by Michael Farris Smith, is his third novel and an outstanding example of gothic southern noir. Oh yeah . . . he's that good. He's that good because he respects the craft of writing and the use of language to paint a word picture of people in pain, trying to put their shat-

tered lives back together after tragic mistakes upended them.

The novel begins with a man named Russell Gaines riding the bus home from the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman, down in the delta. It's where he's just completed an eleven year sentence for drunk driving and vehicular homicide. Russell thinks he's paid his debt - i n full - and wants to put his life back together. But waiting for his return are the two older brothers of the man he killed . . . and they're determined to get revenge.

At the same time, a homeless woman named Maben and her young little daughter are walking to the interstate in the broiling hot sun. She's carrying everything they own in a black plastic garbage bag, hoping for something better when they get to the place where Maben grew up. Exhausted and down to their last few dollars, they hole up in a cheap motel where mother and daughter are hoping for rest and respite. But the night ends for Maben with a hot pistol in her hand as she runs through the dark, and a dead deputy sheriff behind her.

As all their lives collide and destinies intertwine, the moral choices become fewer and fewer and more complex at the same time as the story plays out in an electrifying conclusion. The prose is lyrical, the setting magical and the drama unforgettable.

After extensive research, the students performed six tasks: list three current issues that would most concern your character in 2017; write a State of the Union speech that your character would deliver if they had just been elected president in 2016; at the historic site explain to your peers who your character was, deliver the speech, not reading it, in character; give each person some small gift, cash value \$1 or less each, that is emblematic of your character, and ask and answer appropriate questions during the trip.

Joining Mr. Brown were fellow history teacher Mrs. Elisa Baum and a parent of one of the students, Mrs. Susan Murray. The first stop was the Monticello Government Center. In the Legislative Hearing Room, Catherin Flores Granados spoke as writer Harriet Beecher Stowe. Her three issues were struggle for rights and dignity by black Americans, social injustices suffered by women, and treat-

ment of refugees to America. Next was Kaitlyn Simms as Fannie Lou Hamer, an African-American woman fighting for civil and human rights in the 1950's through the 1970's. Ms. Simms chose voting rights, women's rights, and the Black Lives Matter Movement as her three focal points. Next stop was Planned Parenthood in Monticello where Rachel Collura spoke as Margaret Sanger, pioneer for birth control and women's

rights in the early twentieth century.

Later that morning Jaclyn Hatt spoke at the Andrew Carnegie Library in Port Jervis as Mr. Carnegie. Then at the Waterwheel Café & Bakery in Milford, Pennsylvania, inventor Henry Ford played by Shamus Murray gave his State of the Union Address. Completing the afternoon speeches was Guillermo Granados as environmentalist Rachel Carson at the scenic Kittatinny Point in northwestern New Jersey.

Early on Saturday morning, Jeremiah Scott as Bartolomeo Vanzetti, fish monger, radical immigrant and socialist executed in Massachusetts in the 1920's, gave his speech at a Philadelphia seafood restaurant. At an international market Julia Batista addressed Congress as the freed slave and abolitionist Frederick Douglass. At the U.S. Customs House Student Tyler DuBois spoke as Carl Schurz, the first German-American elected to the Senate in the 1860's and anti-slavery spokesperson. The final address of the day was given by Libby Lake as Alexander Hamilton at the steps of the First National Bank of the United States.

Mr. Brown is hopeful that a lasting impact of the trip will prepare students to be knowledgeable students of history and to be good and informed citizens. Surely this will be a most memorable trip for Mr. Brown, who retires in June after eighteen years teaching at Fallsburg High School.



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

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Senator Bonacic Votes in Favor of Legislation that Would Impose Term Limits on Senate and Assembly Leadership

(Albany, NY)- State Senator John J. Bonacic (R/C/I-Mt. Hope) voted in favor of legislation today that would put into law eight-year term limits for leadership positions in the Senate and Assembly. The bill (\$1229), which Senator Bonacic co-sponsors, builds upon what is already in place in Senate rules and also limits the number of years a legislator can serve as a leader or com-

The bill limits the tenure of the Temporary President of the Senate, Speaker of the Assembly, and minority leaders of both houses to eight years. Legislative committee chairs would also be limited to serving no more than eight consecutive years.

The Senate first voluntarily implemented leadership term limits in 2009 as part of the rules governing the Senate. Adoption of the measure to be acted on today would make them permanent in law for both the Senate and Assembly.

"The Senate has for years adopted voluntary term limits for committee chairs and legislative leaders," said Senator Bonacic. "I encourage my colleagues in the Assembly to pass this bill as soon as possible.

The bill has been sent to the Assembly.

Wallenstein has published 9 collections of poetry, the most recent being At the Surprise Hotel and



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


