Flag Exchange Ceremony in honor of Civil War Veteran, Burgovne Knight

This Veteran's Day, 2016 in the
Tri-Valley Area will be observed
by the Flag Exchange Ceremony,
which has become a tradition in
the Town of Neversink. The
Program will take place at 11:00
am on Friday, November 11th, at
the flag pole located in the
Grahamsville Rural Cemetery on
Route 55 in Grahamsville.


The event will feature the retiring of the flag, which has flown for the past six months, in honor of Marine Veteran, William Lawrence Lamb, Jr. In exchange for the flag just retired, Scout Troop 97 will then accept a flag presented by the Knight Family, which will fly for six months, in honor of Civil War Veteran, Burgoyne Knight.

Burgoyne Knight enlisted in the 120th Regiment Company E in Lackawack on August 14tn, 1862. He was a Private in the infantry and following his discharge in 1864, returned to his home in Unionville, Grahamsville. He and his wife are both buried in the Grahamsville Rural Cemetery. Participating in the event will be Boy Scout Troops 97 and 87, and an Honor Guard of local veterans. The flag exchange is sponsored by the Grahamsville Rural Cemetery Association.

As always, the public is invited to attend and participate in this Veterans Day Observance. We welcome the opportunity to honor any members of the armed forces who might be in the area. Please join us as we pay tribute to all those who have served and all those who currently serve our great nation. Following the ceremony at the Cemetery, a brief flag exchange and wreath- laying ceremony will take place at the Neversink Town Hall Grahamsville.

Fallsburg Conducts Google Classroom Training

(From Pg. 1) FCSD Director of Technology Keith Edwards introduced Ms. Keeler as a Google certified teacher and technology trainer. In the hands-on workshop with fifth grade teachers on the morning of October 18, the teachers received a touchscreen Chromebook computer for professional use, which was fund-ed as part of the grant. Ms. Keeler led the edu-cators in creating a student-centered classroom, using the tools in Google Classroom, developing simple projects for students, and engaging student involvement in the technology.

She emphasized obtaining feedback from a class digitally. It is more immediate and widespread compared to asking for a show of hands in a classroom and watching for one or maybe two hands appear. Ms. Keeler also demonstrated how "talking with a kid" in a chair next to him is the best method to reach him. Of course this is not feasible in our classroom sizes today. but with Google Classroom a teacher can recreate talking with a whole group of students instead of talking at them.

In the research to date on student learning in

the Google Classroom environment, the designers and instructors find that technology does not make learning better. It does save time because it allows a teacher to work with a whole community of learners and not just individuals, and it allows for continual and instant student and teacher feedback. As Ms. Keeler adds here, "I teach kids and ask them to do things. The programs are designed for them to learn from each other as well as from me. These programs work. You will see a lot of movement, great energy and awareness coming from the children. It is exciting to let kids think and ask questions."

The three hour session was fast-paced with a lot to absorb for the teachers, especially the vast majority that is brand new to use of the Google Classroom technology. As a couple teachers shared, it was a start for them, and they realized that once they got firsthand experience through trial and error the technology will help them and their students in learning.

Alice Keeler has seen the breakthroughs in classrooms similar to Fallsburg and travels long distances as "A technology missionary on a quest plans for Christmas Count, election of officers to inspire and help teachers to make vision a real-and a nature film on Nests. Pizza, salad and ity." Her passion for student learning is evident as drinks provided. Free to all. Contact Kate a trainer. Fallsburg's teachers and students cannot

Staghorn Sumac

As it was a nice day Saturday, I decided to take a little walk in the woods before we left for the parade in Woodbourne.


I was surprised to see a flock of robins still on the ground looking for worms! But, it won't be much longer, and those Robins, usually males that decide to winter over, will be changing their diet! Some of the foods they will enjoy are hawthorn fruits, crab-apples and chokecherries, as well as juniper, honeysuckle and in late winter, sumac berries.

There is an abundant 'crop' of Sumac in Sundown.

Most of their bright red leaves have fallen revealing the conical clusters of fuzzy, tightly packed, red berries at the end of the branches.

The staghorn sumac (Rhus typhina) is native to eastern North America, Southeastern Canada, the Midwestern United States and in the Catskill Mountains.

You will often see staghorn sumac along highways as it is tolerates pollution and smog as well as at the forest's edge. They like sun or partial



During the summer a quick glance of its lush green foliage, might give the impression that it is a type of tropical plant. Its lengthy branches are heavily lined with multitudes of long, odd-pinnately lobed, flame-shaped leaves that are compound, with up to 15 leaflets on each side.

From June through July, small green flowers form 8-inch long, pyramid-shaped clusters located at the tips of branches. Male and female flowers are located on separate trees. By mid-summer the flower cones evolve into fuzzy, tightly packed berries that grow in an upright cluster of drupes (little fruits with a single seed in each). They are easy to spot, even from a distance.

Fruits are red, berry-like, hard, and covered with long hairs. The clusters are so compact they look like hairy cones. Fruit may persist until spring.

The berries are edible but very tart. Most birds will eat them later, in the winter, when other food sources have diminished.

Reproduction is by seeds and rhizomes (horizontal underground stems). Root systems tend to be shallow and wide-spreading. Young shoots have thin, dark-brown bark and are densely hairy. Its common name, "staghorn", refers to the fuzzy appearance of the young shoots. They look like the branched antlers of a male deer in velvet. Because plants spread by rhizomes, an area can become populated by many related plants with overlapping crowns that give the appearance of a dense colony with an extensive rounded or flat top. As colonies enlarge, older plants tend to be located in the center and younger plants emerge around the ever-expanding parameter.

While staghorn sumac trees can grow over 30 feet tall they usually do not exceed 15 feet. Stems are generally between 2 to 4 inches wide, but plants with diameters as great at 15 inches have been recorded. Bark is smooth and dark brown. Stems are covered with long, soft hairs and exude a milky sap when cut. Branches display U-shaped leaf scars in winter.


The wood of the Staghorn sumac is soft. They are often considered as junk trees as they are weedy little trees. However, like any other weed, it becomes that because it is growing where it shouldn't. There are however, many people who grow the Staghorn as ornamentals and hedges.

The crowning glory of the Staghorn sumac is its fall foliage. Just the sight of them with their bright flaming color and clusters of red fruit provide a visual warmth on these crispy, cool fall days.


To clean your microwave oven, put a microwavesafe bowl of 1/2 cup vinegar and 1 cup water in the oven, and cook long enough to boil. In addition to removing any lingering odors, this will loosen any baked-on food from the microwave's walls. Take a damp paper towel and wipe the grime away.



My Bad a mile high noir

Mysterious Book Report No. 264 by John Dwaine McKenna

The word *noir* (pronounced NWAR) comes from the French. Its literal translation is **black**, but it can be interpreted as **dark** or wicked. As it applies to the Mysterious Book Report, it's a type of crime fiction that's characterized by cynicism, fatalism and moral ambiguity. The noir genre has become so popular over the past few years that it's now being broken down into sub-headings such as southern noir, urban and even hillbilly noir. Now, thanks to a fortunate series of events, (more about that in just a bit), we're going to introduce all of you to what can only be called *Latino Noir*, and hey, great news – it's happening just a few miles north of Colorado Springs, in Denver, Colorado. That's where author Manuel Ramos lives and works and has situated his series featuring a tough guy named Gus Corral.



My Bad, a mile high noir, (Arte Publico Press, \$17.95, 248 pages, ISBN 978-1-55885-833-6) is the follow-up to the first of the series, entitled Desperado, and

was just released the first of October, 2016.

As the novel begins, Gus Corral is fresh out of prison, where he went down on charges for a robbery and shootout that left several people dead. Then, there was the little matter of a few kidnappings, Mexican cartels and the theft of a priceless religious artifact-but you'll have to read the first novel to find out about all of that. Now, Gus has paid his debt to society, been granted parole and is determined to keep his nose clean. He reports to his Parole Officer, passes random drug tests and has a job working as an investigator and process server for Luis Montez, the aging Chicano lawyer and one-time activist for Hispanic rights who defended Gus and engineered a more lenient sentence than he would otherwise have received. Then, a woman whose husband, a seedy northside Denver bar owner, who was killed under mysterious circumstances in Mexico comes to the office with a wild tale about an unknown partner in an unknown-to her-import business. He's threatening her life; claims he's owed a quarter million dollars by the dead husband and – everything changes for all of them. As the problems and the bodies start mounting up on every page, it looks less and less likely that Gus will be able to keep his freedom - or his life.

Using an economy of words reminiscent of Raymond Chandler and James M. Cain, Mr. Ramos puts the reader on the ground in the fast-disappearing north Denver neighborhoods whose Hispanic identity is being lost to an unrelenting assault of yuppification, urbanization and ever higher real estate prices. With surprises galore, action and plot twists, and even a little pop music history in every chapter, plus a stunning denouement you'll never see coming, My Bad is great crime fiction and entertaining reading. It's so authentic you'll feel like you grew up in the neighborhood! Manuel Ramos was a finalist for a CWA Edgar award and writes tough-guy prose with an understated eloquence other authors can only envy. And the fortunate series of events? I became aware of Deparado because it's on the same Amazon landing page as one of mine. Then, Mr. Ramos and I chanced to meet at the Mountain of Authors event in Colorado Springs last spring. He's a cool

guy and an awesome writer.



NYS DEC Action Taken to Close Fishing from Shandaken **Tunnel Downstream to the** Ashokan Reservoir at Traver Hollow

We received word from NYS DEC Region 3 Fisheries Manager Mike Flaherty that the Esopus Creek is NOW CLOSED to angling from the Shandaken Tunnel (Portal) downstream to the Ashokan Reservoir at Traver Hollow, including Chimney Hole, effective as of, November 2nd. This action was necessary to protect wild brown trout now spawning in extremely low mainstream water for November conditions, with very limited access to tributaries.

Thanks to Todd Spire for generating an electronic petition on this matter that gathered about 150 signatures--- and all the folks who signed it--- in less than a twelve hour period earlier today.

DEC's affirmative action is in the best interest of the wild trout fishery, and the benefits it brings to our region. For folks who like to fish until it's no longer an option, the Ashokan Reservoir and Esopus upstream of the Portal are still open to angling, as are several nearby No Kills on other Catskill rivers.

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
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

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Payday Loan Gives Comptroller Pause
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Kingston, NY (November 2, 2016) - A County
employee getting paid twice in the same pay period
has prompted the Office of Ulster County
Comptroller Elliott Auerbach to prescribe a new accounting practice regarding payroll processing. The newly prescribed procedure would shore up and streamline the correction, void, and reissue process when County employees are mistakenly over or underpaid, which would help prevent financial loss and/or litigation. In accordance with the Ulster County Charter, the Comptroller shall "prescribe generally accepted government accounting methods to be used by all units of County government." "While conducting routine bank reconciliations, my Office identified a glaring hole in the County's payroll correction process that literally and figuratively doesn't add up," said the Comptroller. "The steps currently taken to adjust and reissue inaccurate checks for employees are not uniform, mostly discretionary, and overly reliant on manual tracking and manipulation of records. We need to tighten up the process so there isn't one set of rules for one employee and an entirely different set for another." The issue came to light after the Comptroller's Audit Team found a situation where an employee, whose pay check is electronically deposited, was paid twice for the same pay period. The first paycheck contained an underpay-ment error of \$20 net so a second, corrected paycheck deposit was made. Instead of recouping the initial deposit in a timely manner, the Department of Finance permitted a repayment adjustment by the employee over the course of three subsequent biweekly paychecks - in essence, providing a loan through use of public funds. Complicating the matter and urging the Comptroller to renew his call for attention was the materialization of one of his concerns: one adjustment never went through, ultimate-ly delaying repayment to the County. "We're cognizant that mistakes happen and sometimes can't be avoided," continued the Comptroller. "However, when they do, we need internal controls that deal with them swiftly, objectively, and efficiently. There needs to be a single, standard practice for dealing with this type of correction so that we don't put the County or an employee in an untenable position where tax dollars end up where they don't belong." 



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Residents And Visitors Now Have A New Public Space To **Enjoy Iconic Views Of The Shawangunk Mountains**



After opening the new Carmine Liberta Bridge at the end of Main Street in New Paltz twenty-two days ago, Ulster County Executive Mike Hein returned to unveil the second phase of the project: a viewing platform providing world-class views of the Shawangunk Mountains. The viewing platform was built by re-purposing the abutment of a temporary bridge that allowed traffic to continue to cross the Wallkill River without interruption. The viewing area features large boulders comprised of Shawangunk conglomerate, the same type of stone that comprises the Shawangunk Mountains as well as informa-

tional signage providing maps, facts and details of nearby attractions.

Michael P. Hein, Ulster County Executive stated, "We set out to reinvent how infrastructure is done in Ulster County and create something very special and I want to thank the Legislature for their support throughout the process. With the overlook, everyone now has the opportunity to truly enjoy the natural beauty and iconic views of the mountains," said County Executive Mike Hein. "Whether it is our residents or visitors to Ulster County, this will be a breathtaking place available for everyone. I am so proud that our incredible Department of Public Works accomplished this amazing viewing platform less than a month after delivering the new Carmine Liberta Memorial Bridge ahead of schedule and under budget with virtually no negative impact on our citizens during construction. I now invite everyone to enjoy this extraordinary public space."

The scenic overlook is located adjacent to the new redesigned Carmine Liberta Memorial Bridge which opened on October 11, 2016. The bridge was named in 2008 for Carmine Liberta, a New Paltz Native, a decorated Korean War Veteran, and Veterans affairs activist. The new "Pony Arch" bridge features rustic weathered steel allowing it to blend into its surroundings. It now includes an enhanced LED lit sidewalk and wider shoulders for safer passage by pedestrians and bicyclists. Through County Executive Hein's "Building A Better Ulster County" initiative, the county has spent over \$30 million this year and last year to overhaul its infrastructure and has committed another \$15 million in the proposed 2017 Executive Budget.



Statement from UC Commissioner of Social Services Michael A. Iapoce

"The proposed move of the Ulster County Family Court from its current location to the County-owned Business Resource Center has created debate and disagreement. There have been several reasons advanced by those who want to maintain the current location, including: moving the facility will be harmful to Kingston's economy and it will be inconvenient for attorneys. However, this relocation is not about any one individual city or town or if lawyers have to drive an additional 800 feet outside the City line; it is about the children and families who rely on Family Court to preside over their cases and how we can provide the best services for them. The current Family Court facility is woefully inadequate and siting the court adjacent to the Department of Social Services would provide practical and long term benefits to the children and families who actually appear in the court since many of the services mandated by Family Court are provided at DSS offices. Everyone should recognize and agree that locating the services integral to children who are in Family Court within the same complex is beneficial to them. Once politics and special interests are pushed aside and the focus is placed on where it truly should be: children and families, there should be no disagreement.

"At the BRC Social Services provides: Child Protective, Foster Care and Preventive Services, Coordinated Children Services, supervised visitation, Adult Protective Services and Child Support Enforcement. In addition, Temporary Assistance Programs, Daycare Assistance, HEAP, Medicaid and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program are administered at this location as well. These programs are utilized by many of the children and families who appear in Family Court and the new location would increase accessibility for them. Additionally, dozens of DSS caseworkers and staff attend Family Court daily. The BRC location represents tremendous opportunities for increased efficiency and productivity due to decreased waiting and travel times for staff.

"As Commissioner of Social Services I was appointed to a five year term and because of that I have a unique perspective and focus on providing the best services to our residents. In addition to my perspective, I direct you to a portion of a letter from the New York State Office of Court Administration to Ulster County dated May 26, 2016:

It is our view that the BRC is uniquely suited to be developed into a first-rate Family Court facility that complies with the Chief Judge's facility guidelines, achieves compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, is technologically up-to-date, and, most importantly, will provide the people of Ulster County with a courthouse that is appropriate for the important work of this court.

"The primary emphasis must be what is best for families and children and I agree with the Ulster County Legislature who recognized that when it approved the re-location."



Dear Tri-Valley CSD School Community:

Our Board of Education and Administrators are committed to protecting student, teacher, and staff health. To protect our community, Tri-Valley CSD has tested our schools' drinking water for lead. High levels of lead in drinking water can cause health problems. Lead is most dangerous for pregnant women, infants, and children under 6 years old. Exposure to high levels of lead during pregnancy contributes to low birth weight and developmental delays in infants. In young children, lead exposure can lower IQ levels, affect hearing, reduce attention spans, and hurt school performance. At very high levels, lead can even cause brain damage.

To protect public health, New York State law requires, and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) suggests, that schools test their drinking water for lead. If lead is found at any water outlets at levels above 15 parts per billion (ppb), corrective actions must be taken.

Of 47 water samples we tested in the Elementary School, 14 showed lead levels above the 15 ppb mark. In other words, 67% of the water outlets tested did not have any lead problems. We also tested the water in September and October for the Secondary School, but do not yet have the results. We expect those results within the next week or two.

We are providing water coolers for the students in grades Pre-K - 12, as well as staff. We are making sure no one uses the drinking fountains in any school until we have remedied the lead levels at the Elementary School, and received the results for the Secondary School. All affected areas will have signs posted on them and their water supply will be turned off. The District will work very closely with environmental specialists as we work through next steps. Additionally, we will re-test after corrective actions have been made.

Washington, D.C. - U.S. Senators Charles Schumer and Kirsten Gillibrand today announced the release of \$325,060,769 in heating and home energy assistance funds from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is the main federal program that helps low-income households and seniors with their energy bills, providing vital assistance dur-ing both the cold winter and hot summer months. Even though the number of households eligible for the program continues to exceed those receiving assistance, this funding has been a lifeline during the economic downturn and rising energy costs, helping to ensure that people do not have to choose between paying their energy bills and paying for food or medicine. New York State is the largest beneficiary of LIHEAP funds in the nation and over one million New Yorkers rely on LIHEAP to heat their homes during the winter.

"Hundreds of thousands of fixed-income seniors and low- to moderate- income New Yorkers rely on LIHEAP funding to help pay for the home heating costs that have become a larger and larger share of their budget. With winter fast approaching, this \$325 million federal investment will help New York's most vulnerable cover their high energy costs, meaning fewer peo-ple will have to make the agonizing decision over whether to pay energy bills or put food on the table," said Senator Schumer.

"This necessary funding will help keep more than one million New Yorkers warm this winter," said Senator Gillibrand. "No family in our state should ever be left behind in the cold in their home. This first installment is crucial for families throughout the state who have braved through recent storms and frigid temperatures to have the resources they need to stay warm throughout the winter."

New York State is set to receive over \$325 million as part of initial LIHEAP funding provided under the Continuing Appropriations Resolution of 2017. New York State has received over \$300 million in LIHEAP funding each fiscal year for the last eight years. Without these federal resources, households nationwide may have been subject to cuts in federal heating

In March 2016, Schumer and Gillibrand were joined by a group of 39 senators in a bipartisan letter to the leadership of the Senate Appropriations Committee urging for increased funding to LIHEAP in Fiscal Year 2017 to ensure more families can access the resources they need to heat their homes this winter.

With the average LIHEAP funding estimated to cover less than half of the average home heating costs for households, Schumer and Gillibrand along with 38 senators called on the President in 2015 to restore LIHEAP funding to not less than \$4.7 billion in the FY 17 President's budget request to Congress.
