## **Grahamsville Reformed Church** Marks 175th Anniversary

The Grahamsville Reformed Church stands tall, silhouetted against the mountainside, its white steeple and belfry towering above the community. On Sunday, October 6th, the church celebrated its 175th anniversary, with a special luncheon and a new sign dedication ceremony. The new church sign, constructed by Eagle Scout, Carsen Terwilliger, was dedicated in memory of long-time church Elder, Fred Robertson, and long-time church member, Helen Mickelson.

It was on November 13, 1844, that the first Reformed Dutch Church in the Chestnut Valley, a half mile from the present location, was dedicated. In 1882, the church was outgrown and a new church was built at the present location. When the new church was completed, the old chapel was moved to Wawarsing, probably by ox team, where it was to be used as the Wawarsing Gospel Church.

The Grahamsville Reformed Church of today still stands tall, silhouetted against the hills that brought forth the hardy pioneers. Included within the designated Grahamsville Historic District, it is hoped that the church will always represent the power of hope in people's lives.



## Jack has Jumped Out of the Pulpit!

It is the time of year that you won't see Jack in the Pulpit, but instead a cluster of very noticeable red berries.

If you take a walk out in the woods and come across one of this amazingly beautiful clump of red berries - please don't touch them. They are indeed poisonous to humans, but just as important, a treat for many birds and small animals. Each red berry contains several seeds which are spread by the

hungry little birds and animals after ingestion



This native plant, also called Indian turnip, is unmistakable in our moist woods. This plant enjoys growing in open glades in the forest in rich, moist soil. They are an herbaceous perennial plant with trifoliate leaves and a flower that contains a spadix, or club, covered by a striped hood reminiscent of an old-fashioned pulpit.

A Jack-in-the-Pulpit (Arisaema

triphyllum) is classified in the Arum family (Araceae) along with skunk cabbage and the calla lily. It grows from 12-18 tall from an underground stem or corm. In spring it sends up a stout stem that looks like a green candle which unrolls into the two three pointed leaves on a flower stalk.

During late spring through early summer, tiny white flowers clustered around a finger-like shape that we call 'Jack' (spadix) and a leaf-like canopy arches over the spadix. This pulpit (spathe) is striped with maroon and green or white and green. Some botanists say this is due to sunny conditions during growth so that dark Jacks are found in shady deep woods, light Jacks in open locations, however, I've found both growing side by side in our yard and tend to think that sunlight may not be the only determinant deciding the coloration factor.

The two large green, compound, long-petioled leaves (1-1.5' long), divided into three leaflets each, emanate upward from a single stalk and provide umbrella-like shade to the flower. The fleshy stalk and leaves lend an almost tropical aura to the plant. Flowering plants initially produce only male flowers, but become hermaphroditic as they mature over the course of several years (male flowers are on the upper part of spadix and female on lower part). Most plants in a colony will vanish by mid-summer and become dormant, but the mature, hermaphroditic flowering plant will expose a cluster of green berries as the pulpit dries up and drops off. And now that summer has ended, the berries have ripened and have become the bright red berries that are quite visible. In fact, on Sunday, when it was rather dark and gloomy, the showy berries stood out and almost glowed against the drab dried leaves that had already fallen.

American pioneers learned from the Native Americans to look for this distinctive plant in spring in moist eastern woodlands. They called it Bog Onion. They also learned that the bulb was poisonous when eaten raw but became a safe, spicy delicacy when cooked.

In the spring, when bear come out of hibernation they will root out and eat Jack-in-the-Pulpit as the irritating peppery bulb expands the bear's shrunken bowels to normalcy.

According to some Native American tribes, this plant was initially thought to be a great 'diagnostic' tool. The seeds were often dropped into small pools of water, and if they floated, then the patient would survive; if they sank, however, then the patient would get sicker or even die. A preparation of the root was reported to have been used by Native Americans as a treatment for sore eyes. Preparations were also made to treat rheumatism, bronchitis, and snakebites. One report on "Indian Turnips" claims the Meskwaki Indians, the "people of red earth" of Algonquian origin, used the acrid seeds to poison their enemies during the heat of battle. They would poison their meats with the seeds!

When you are out for an autumn walk in the woods, the chances of seeing a bright red cluster of berries is not uncommon. In fact, a Jack-in-the-Pulpit plant is easier to spot this time of the year, however, you won't see Jack again until next spring when he returns to his familiar pulpit.

Is it possible that the Jack's last name is Frost and the only reason he has left the pulpit for now was to take up another job this frosty time of year?

We humans all have one thing in common . . . we are endlessly curious. We've just gotta know how and why things happen, as well as where, when and what. We are compelled as a species to look through the window, open the door, or peek around the corner to see what we haven't seen and learn what we don't know. Miraculum, (Polis Books, \$26.00, 336 pages, ISBN 978-1-947993-41-9) by Steph Post, begins in 1922, out near Texas-Louisiana border where Mr. Pontilliar's carnival has just set up for a three day run before moving on to the big city of Baton Rouge. The crowds are mediocre, the heat almost unbearable and boredom oppressive one starlit summer night, when Ruby, the tattooed snake charmer, first notices the strange man standing in the crowd, lighting a cigarette. He's unusually good-looking, cool and collected despite the heat and the fact that he's wearing a black suit and tie which cost more than the entire carnival is worth. The outlander's name is Daniel. He's charming, mercurial, and charismatic when he joins the carnival as a geek ... a performer







This week we honor Lawrence Tierney and his signature motion picture "DILLINGER." "There is absolutely no light in his eyes," wrote author and poet Barry Gifford about actor Lawrence

Tierney, an imposing lead and character actor in features from the dawn of film noir in the 1940s through the 1990s with gruff turns in "Reservoir Dogs" (1991), among countless other projects. In crime films like "Dillinger" (1945), "The Devil Thumbs a Ride" (1947) and "Born to Kill" (1947), Tierney possessed an air of implacable menace behind pale, narrow eyes, and fittingly, his characters seemed capable of the most and fittingry, his characters seened capable of the most senseless violence for purely sadistic reasons. By the early 1970s, he had left acting and was driving a hansom cab in New York, however in 1972 he was offered a strong supporting role as Harold Palmer, family lawyer, in the film "Montage," he was to appear as personal confident to a possibly insane rock star, to be played by Alice Cooper, and opposite, our ingénue, the love-ly talented Donna Theodore. The film was never shot. Financial problems ended the production. However, after gaining sobriety in the 1980s Tierney made an astonishing number of character turns in features and television, often as elderly but still dangerous criminals, cops and other streetwise types, most notably as the crusty crime boss in Quentin Tarantino's "Dogs." Still capable of making headlines for his irascibility in his seventh decade, Tierney remained one of Hollywood's most enduring tough guys simply by being himself. Born in Brooklyn, NY on March 15, 1919, Lawrence Tierney was the son of a policeman, also named Lawrence Tierney. Both of his brothers, Gerard and Edward also became actors, with Gerard billing himself as Scott Brady and enjoying a lengthy career playing tough guys not unlike his brother, while Edward left the business after a string of minor roles to become a build-ing contractor. Tierney was a star athlete at Brooklyn's Boys High School, and won sports scholarship to Manhattan College. Bounced between various gigs before landing a job as a male model for the Sears Roebuck catalog. Stage work was then suggested to him, and he joined the Black Friars theatre group and the American-Irish Theatre. A scout for RKO saw one of his performances and signed him to a contract in 1943. He was Broad-shouldered and brawny, with a cast iron jaw and a steely gaze, he loomed heavily in the background of suave. In "Dillinger" (crime, 1945) the legendary gunman plots a series of daring heists. D: Max Nosseck. Edmund Lowe, Anne Jeffreys, Lawrence Tierney, Eduardo Ciannelli, Elisha Cook, Jr., Marc Lawrence. Solid gangster yarn written by Philip Yordan. One of the best B movies of its kind (though a key bank robbery is comprised of stock footage lifted from Fritz Lang's "YOU ONLY LIVE ONCE").
