Last Supper Before the Long Flight of the Hummingbirds

This past Saturday while visiting our 5 year old grandson, Jayce and family, he pointed out 'a bird' that was flying around their almost constructed deck. While we couldn't go out on the deck to get close at the little bird,

we could see through the sliding glass door it was a Hummingbird.

If you step out on our back porch right now you may get bombardered by Hummingbirds!

It seems we fill the feeder with sugar water more now than we did all summer.

It makes a lot of sense. It won't be for long now the Ruby Throated Hummingbirds will be heading toward warmer weather where they will live in their winter homes.



The Ruby-throated hummingbird is the only hummingbird east of the Rockies. While in the Catskills this past spring and summer you may have seen one of the tiny males aggressively defending his territory, especially if there was a nest nearby. The tiny nests are about 1 1/2 inches in diameter and made of bits of lichen and moss, lined with soft dandelion-seed down and spider webs. The female generally lays two pure white eggs, each the size of a navy bean. Nature protects these smallest of all bird eggs with a horrible bitter taste that discourages all nest-robbers.

Mother hummingbirds raise the young alone. As a rule, males mate with several partners and don't help build the nest, incubate eggs or feed chicks, however, they do their part. The father's aggressive defense of several nesting and feeding territories makes it safer and easier for females to collect food.

Baby Ruby-throats grow rapidly as they eat nectar and tiny insects which the mother literally pumps down their throats from her needle-sharp bill. The young leave the nest about a month after hatching and quickly learn to feed themselves. A favorite treat in Sundown is the red bee balm. They love red flowers, especially long necked ones into which they thrust their slender bills and tubular tongues for nectar. They also seem to like the nectar of the orange jewel weed that grows profusely in our area. The tip of a Hummingbird's tongue is frayed like a tiny brush that can whisk insects into their mouths during midair feeding.

Now is the time that the Ruby-throats will begin to stuff themselves and gain 50% of their body weight in preparation for their long flight. Once leaving the Catskills they will start their journey and fly south about two hundred miles non-stop at treetop level. Then they rest, tidy themselves a bit and eat some more before continuing the journey. While flying at night the hummingbirds will orient themselves by the stars and the earth's magnetic field and while flying during the day they will use the sun, earth's magnetic field and landmarks such as rivers, mountains and coastlines. Their wings rotate like a helicopter blade, 75 times per second, making the humming sound that gives this little bird its name. They can hover and fly backwards.

In spite of being so tiny and delicate, these little Ruby-throated hummingbirds will fly across the 500-mile-wide Gulf of Mexico non-stop continuing to eat insects and will sleep while flying!

The little hummingbirds at our feeder in Sundown will most probably return to the same place for several years. With this in mind, we will make sure that in the spring Jayce will have a hummingbird feeder to place on his new deck and welcome back his new friend. Yes, the same hummingbirds we bid farewell this year, most likely will be the same wee bronze-green beauties we will see again next spring.

Stream Program conducted an invasive species survey along the Chestnut Creek and Upper Rondout Creek to identify and map the presence of Japanese Knotweed. Japanese Knotweed is a fast-growing highly invasive plant that quickly out-competes native vegetation and takes over streambanks. It disturbs native ecosystems by replacing our native trees and shrubs, restricts recreation by preventing access to streambanks with thick overcrowded growth, and can damage infrastructure.


Legacy Mysterious Book Report No. 5 The Ghost Moths Mysterious Book Report No. 440


The Ghost Moths, (Blackstone Publishing, \$27.99, 368 pages, ISBN 978-1-5384-6923-1) by Harry Farthing, is a painstakingly researched, carefully plotted and well-written issues-driven thriller that takes place among the towering eight thousand meter peaks of South Asia's Himalayan Mountains.

The novel is about the occupied nation of Tibet . . . and it's long struggle for freedom. It begins with the discovery of a sacred object by a young boy in the mountains of Southern Tibet, just as the Chinese Communist Army comes in and claims the tiny country as its sovereign territory in the early 1950s, setting off a conflict

which rages to this very day, with no ending in sight.



Could the mysterious and ghostly images of a simple moth that keep appearing at critical times and in crucial places have a role to play in the ongoing conflict? Are they somehow related to the shadowy group of climbers who called themselves 'The Ghost Moths,' and fought to save Tibetan culture and sacred objects during the so-called "Cultural Revolution" back in the 70s? Is there any hope of escaping the attention of a sadistic Chinese army officer nicknamed 'Yama' . . . for the Tibetan Lord of Death? The answers to all of those questions, and more, can only be found by reading The Ghost Moths. It's one of the most engaging, propulsive, and, dare we say it, educational novels to come along since The Great Wall was built. The Ghost Moths is fiction with a bite . . . and a story the whole world should sit up and take notice of . . . because in a just world this novel would go viral. It's that good!



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
Olive Jar by Carol Olsen LaMonda

I do remember, each morning, as I have my second cup of coffee and turn on the news that I would probably be starting third period English class seventeen years ago.







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
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The 2022 Summer Reading & Exercise Challenge is Winding Down Assemblymember Kevin Cahill Urges Students to Turn in Their Flyers



The UC BOE has a relationship with Clear Ballot dating back to 2020 when the Department utilized funds from the Federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA) Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES) of 2020 to purchase a central counting system powered by Clear Ballot for tabulating absentee and affidavit votes as well as conducting 3% audits of all in person voting systems. This investment has resulted in efficiency and cost savings to Ulster County taxpayers since its implementation in 2020.

Clear Ballot will be demonstrating their latest technology, "Clear Cast Go" a high speed in person paper ballot scanner as well as "Clear Mark" their solution to ADA compliance requirements for in person voting. Please see the attached flyer for more information.

In 2022 the UC Board of Elections was granted by the Ulster County Legislature a capital project to invest in new in person voting systems. In the spirit of transparency, we are conducing in person experiences with the systems we are exploring for purchase. This event is the first we are offering. Additionally, in July the Ulster County Board of Elections moved to our new location at 79 Hurley Ave, Suite 112, known locally as the former site of the newspaper the Daily Freeman. We have since conducted a historic Special and Primary Election out of our new facility and are pleased with the logistical benefits of being in a centralized location.

Annual Out of Reach report finds that rental housing remains unaffordable for average residents across the Hudson Valley

• Report examines wages, rent and living costs for renters in the Hudson Valley

• Typical renter falls \$300-\$2,900 short of covering rent and living costs in each county

Pattern or Progress today released Out of Reach Hudson Valley 2022, an annual report that examines the gap between wages and the cost of rental housing for those living in the nine-county region. The report found that a single person making average wages cannot afford rent and modest living expenses in any of the nine counties. A renter making average wages falls short of their bills by \$336 to \$2,908, depending on the county in which they live. The outlook is equally difficult for families in rental housing, and worse for single parents.

"The conclusions in Out of Reach should trouble anyone who cares about the wellbeing of our neighbors who depend on rental housing," Pattern CEO Adam Bosch said. "Too many people cannot afford their rent and living expenses without considerable help. The people who are struggling most work in grocery stores, schools, medical facilities, restaurants, and other necessary jobs that make our region viable and attractive. The Hudson Valley will struggle to sustain a workforce unless we understand the systems that created the imbalance between wages and rent, and actively seek solutions that will help people to live in our communities without emptying their pockets every month."

Out of Reach utilizes county-by-county data from the National Low Income Housing Coalition, which examines hourly wages and fair-market rents to measure the affordability of rental housing. Affordability is calculated on the standard that no individual or family should spend more than 30 percent of its total monthly income on housing. Pattern examined data for the nine-county region, including Columbia, Dutchess, Greene, Orange, Putnam, Rockland, Sullivan, Ulster and Westchester counties.

Some key conclusions from the report include the following:

o Single adults working 40 hours per week can only afford fair-market rent for a one-bedroom apartment in Sullivan County. Renters in the other eight counties needed to earn anywhere from \$3 to \$20 more per hour to afford rent in their respective counties. Renters in

those counties are considered "cost burdened."

- o Wages earned by a typical renter ranged from 36-60 percent of the area median income, a key metric for housing policies and programs.
- o The rental affordability gap closed slightly compared to 2021, as the average wage for renters increased by approximately \$2 to \$5 per hour across the region.
- o Families are also stretched thin. Two working adults in a two-bedroom apartment can afford rent in seven of the nine counties. Fair-market rents remain unaffordable in Putnam and Rockland. However, two working renters meet the affordability standard by less than \$100 per month in Greene, Orange and Ulster counties, which leaves little money leftover for other expenditures or emergencies.
- o A single person making average wages cannot afford rent and modest living expenses in any of the nine Hudson Valley counties. Pattern researchers examined affordability more broadly in 2022 by combining fair-market rents with modest living expenses for necessities such as food, transportation, health care, payroll taxes and more. This painted a more complete picture of affordability for renters across the region. Our analysis of rent and modest yet adequate living expenses found the following:
- o The average wage of renters falls short of meeting rent and modest living expenses by \$336 to \$2,908 across the region. We refer to this as the "wage gap."
- o The variability of this wage gap is driven largely by housing, as housing costs vary more than non-housing costs by about 17 percent regionwide.
- o Renters throughout the region can only afford their bills if they live with a roommate or spouse, maintain a severely restrained standard of living, work long hours, or seek government assistance.
- o Families in rental housing are also stretched thin, as the cost of supporting children adds anywhere from \$1,600-\$2,600 per month.

All the data indicate that renters in the Hudson Valley are living month-to-month, with little money leftover for savings or emergencies. This has broader implications for the region. Many renters cannot save to purchase a home, which relegates them to paying rents that are sometimes higher than the monthly cost of a mortgage. The rent gap and wage gap also compel young families to forgo having children or have fewer children. These trends have been well documented across the region in recent decades as live birth rates declined, school enrollments dropped, and the population of some counties declined or stagnated.



Federal Funding To Support Development of Mobile Units Throughout New York State

Funding Also To Enable 15 Service Providers To Support Street Outreach Services in New York City, the Southern Tier, and the Mohawk Valley

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced \$10.25 million in federal funding to bolster harm reduction services for marginalized and high-risk populations throughout New York. Administered by the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports, \$5.75 million is earmarked to support the development of mobile medication units, and \$4.5 million is being awarded to help 15 providers establish street outreach units for engaging populations that have difficulty accessing care.

"My administration will continue using every tool at our disposal to help individuals impacted by addiction and address the heart-wrenching toll overdoses have taken on communities across our state," Governor Hochul said. "The \$10.25 million announced today will help fund these critical services and help connect New Yorkers to the support and resources they need to break the vicious cycle of addiction."

New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports Commissioner Chinazo Cunningham said, "Every individual has different needs and goals related to their recovery, and at OASAS, we are dedicated to meeting them wherever they are and offering any help they require to reach their goals. These new mobile medication units and street outreach efforts will allow us to connect with high-risk populations, engage more people, and link them to lifesaving assistance and support."

Mobile Medication Units

All mobile units will offer admission assessments and medication induction, medication administration and observation, toxicology tests, and other medical services. The development of mobile medication units was made possible by a U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration rule change, allowing them to be operated by existing treatment providers.

This funding for the units was provided through the federal State Opioid Response Grant, which is administered jointly by the Research Foundation for Mental Hygiene and OASAS. The following providers will each receive \$550,000 to establish new mobile medication units:

Mid-Hudson

o Cornerstone Family Healthcare

In addition to the mobile units, the federal funding will also be used to expand and enhance harm reduction services in the Harlem, West Midtown, Lower East Side, and Bronx neighborhoods of New York City, as well as in communities in the Southern Tier and Mohawk Valley region. Through this initiative, outreach workers will visit areas where high-risk populations tend to congregate - places such as parks and encampments of people experiencing homelessness - to offer overdose prevention and education, naloxone dispensing and prescribing, education on safe sex and sexually transmitted infection management, and connections to other services.

This initiative is part of OASAS's ongoing to expand harm reduction services throughout New York State. Harm reduction includes low-threshold access to medications for opioid use disorder and other medical services, peer support services, and referrals to other services, such as follow-up visits for continuity of care.

Funding for the outreach initiative was provided through the federal Substance Abuse Prevention and Treatment Block Grant. Providers with one location are being awarded up to \$250,000, while those with two locations are receiving up to \$400,000.

Senator Charles E. Schumer said, "New York is on the front-lines of the opioid crisis, and this funding will tackle the heart of this epidemic by expanding access to care, giving people the support they need to get back on their feet, and saving lives. We need an all-of-the-above approach: more interdiction, prevention, treatment and recovery to fight the flow of drugs and more effectively assist those who are suffering from addiction. That is why I am proud to deliver this funding today - and why I fought for historic increases for addiction services in the COVID relief bills, and why I will keep fighting increases to these federal programs to give New York all the resources it needs to fight the fentanyl-fueled opioid crisis."

New York State has instituted an aggressive, multi-pronged approach to addressing the overdose epidemic and created a nation-leading continuum of addiction care with full prevention, treatment, recovery, and harm reduction services. The State has worked to expand access to traditional services, including crisis services, inpatient, outpatient, and residential treatment programs, as well as medication to treat addiction, and mobile treatment and transportation services.

(From Pg. 32) Governor Hochul was a member of the New York State Heroin and Opioid Task Force, which recommended new, non-traditional services in 2016, including recovery centers, youth clubhouses, expanded peer services, and open access centers, which provide immediate assessments and referrals to care. These services are now in communities throughout the state and have helped New Yorkers in need of access care closer to where they live.

Gillibrand Calls for **Additional Funding for Community Health Force** Workers to Help Tackle Ongoing Health Crises

ESTATES & TRUSTS • INJURY & MORE WASHINGTON DC - Today, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand called on congressional leadership to include at least \$1 billion for community health workers in any upcoming COVID-19 supplemental funding package to help tackle health care issues at the local level. The funds that Senator Gillibrand seeks in her letter would build on the \$3 billion she secured in the American Rescue Plan based on her legislation - the Health Force, Resilience Force, and Jobs to Fight COVID-19 Act (Health Force). The CDC has been using this funding to provide much-needed support to health workers treating

COVID-19 and other patients at the ground level, including in New York, as well as helping with vaccine administration and connecting

underserved communities with social and wraparound services.

"The public health workforce is the pillar that keeps our communities safe and healthy. It's our public health system that provides assistance in emergencies, helps people make the most of the health services available to them, and connects them to services outside of the doctor's office, like housing and nutrition support, that play just as big of a role in their overall health," said Senator Gillibrand. "That's why I believe that every community should have a Health Force - a strong, local community health workforce like the ones we've been able to establish in New York, providing boots-on-the-ground, all-around health and social service support to those who need it the most. I'm calling on congressional leadership to include at least \$1 billion for community health workers in any upcoming COVID-19 supplemental funding package to tackle these public health challenges from the local level."

The \$3 billion already secured by Senator Gillibrand in the American Rescue Plan is being invested in the creation of a robust public health workforce, providing community leaders with the tools to improve health outcomes in their communities.

In New York, the recent monkeypox and polio outbreaks are causing great concern. As we enter into the fall season, health care officials are warning about a potential uptick in COVID-19 infections as people begin to spend more time indoors. These simultaneous health crises demand urgent resources to alleviate an already strained health care system. New York City received \$35 million from Gillibrand's Health Force initiative and established the inaugural New York City Public Health Corps with more than 500 community health care workers. The New York City Public Health Corps has managed to help with a range of issues, from getting people vaccinated to counseling residents about diabetes and depression.

Statement from the Office of the Ulster County Executive on 701 Grant Foreclosure

"Today the County initiated foreclosure proceedings in Ulster County Court against the owners of 701 Grant Avenue, a large commercial building in the Town of Ulster. Based on prior discussions with the owner, we expect the foreclosure to proceed without delay, resulting in the County taking ownership prior to the end of 2022. Between now and then we will seek support from the County Legislature to transition the property back to productive use. Our Department of Economic Development is working with the remaining tenants in the building to keep them and the jobs they provide here in our County. We look forward to continuing our discussion with the County Legislature and the County Comptroller on a process to expedite foreclosure proceedings in the future."

RYAN WARD "3,2,1, RING BALONEY!"

Ring toss. Whac-A-Mole. Skee-ball. Hot Shot. Water guns. Guess-my-weight. These were the classics. These were how Ryan Ward earned his first paycheck. At a certain point, outside of the obvious perils of the job, Ward began to ask himself: What exactly happens at an amusement park? He defines it as one giant social and psychological experiment where we enter into an unwritten agreement to suspend disbelief. It is a place where we form groups and watch one another willingly act out fantastical stories for pleasure, a chance to escape established reality, or simply a chance to win. A place where fact and fiction become one, and we don't really care. Glossy, colorful, tasty things are for sale, and we are along for the ride.

Ryan Ward likens the amusement park to our lives unfolding through the news, politics, social media, and, increasingly, firsthand experience. How we strain our eyes to identify truth from a lie, a good-faith intention from manipulation, an honest gesture from pure fabrication, yet these become more and more out of focus. We are in the Hall of Mirrors-the Funhouse...is there a way out?

Ryan Ward is the owner/director of the Ruffed Grouse Gallery in Narrowsburg, NY. Also, as the Curator of The Maslow Collection in Scranton, Pennsylvania he has curated numerous exhibitions including, "Forming The Maslow Collection: A Reflection on the NYC Art Scene in the 80s and 90s," "SLUFF: Visual Essays on Gilberton, PA by Alex Roth," "MAKE, BELIEVE: The Maslow Collection and the Moving Image," and "CO-OPTIC: Philadelphia-based Painters at Shepherd University." As Exhibition Director of Test Pattern Gallery, he organized diverse exhibitions of local and international artists. Ward holds an MFA from the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts. His own work explores the malleability of history through painting and installation. As the recipient of the 2014 Murray Dessner Memorial Travel Prize, he executed an in-depth investigation of curatorial methods employed at American historical sites.

This research has led to various lectures as well as recent solo and group exhibitions in Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New York, West Virginia, New Mexico, and Italy. Ward has taught at Studio Arts College International in Florence, Italy, and currently teaches drawing and painting at Marywood University.

"SUBTERRANEAN"

Curated by Rashmi Viswanathan, "Subterranean" brings together two artists, Jamie Kim and Francis Estrada, whose works show a narrative caught between the past and the present. Kim's figurative paintings and portraits are heavily influenced by news and media sources, traditional Korean folk-art imagery, and childhood photographs. She juxtaposes elements from her personal history with those from collective cultural memory, blending seemingly dispar ate elements into imaginary narratives that feel real and familiar.

Francis Estrada's multidisciplinary practice extracts from multiple archives. From the American archival footage of its short-lived but impactful occupation of the Philippines to contemporary news imagery of state-sanctioned violence under the current regime of Rodrigo Duterte. Re-interpreting historical archives within a decolonial and anti-authoritarian framework, he re-imagines the lives and times of people placed at the margins of the state.

Rashmi Viswanathan is a Modern and Contemporary Art historian who looks at how arts move across different cultural, regional, and temporal contexts. She is an Assistant Professor at the University of Hartford and lives in Brooklyn.



Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) are speciallytrained, objective community volunteers appointed by Family Court to advocate for children who are in out-of-home placement or who are at risk of being placed in foster care.

CASA is appointed by court order to collaborate with others involved in a child's case and gather information from all interested persons including parents, foster parents, teachers, case managers, doctors, therapists, attorneys, other service providers, and the child. CASA provides fact-based reports to assist the court in addressing the child's needs and in determining what is in their best interest.

\$15.3 Million Awarded in First Round To Accelerate Growth in the Life Science Industry and Combat Infectious Diseases and Other Public Health Threats

Applications Also Open for Fourth Round of \$15 Million NYFIRST Grant Program To Bring World-Class Translational Researchers to New York State

Governor Kathy Hochul today announced applications are now available for the second round of New York's \$40 million Biodefense Commercialization Fund. The Fund, which awarded \$15.3 million in grants to eight startups and 10 academic centers in April, was established to accelerate the development and commercialization of life science research innovations that address serious infectious disease health threats while creating jobs and encouraging continued growth across New York State's expanding life science industry.

"Thanks to the \$40 million Biodefense Commercialization Fund, New York businesses are applying lessons learned from the COVID-19 pandemic to spark innovation and grow the state's economy," Governor Hochul said. "With this funding, we are leading the fight to combat infectious diseases, bringing significant jobs and investment to New York State, and better preparing for our future. I am thrilled to announce that applications for the second round of funding are now live, and I encourage startups and early-stage companies to seize this opportunity to help grow our state's thriving life science sector."

New York State Department of Health Commissioner Dr. Mary T. Bassett said, "Accelerating innovation in life sciences through the Biodefense Commercialization Fund will further enable our state and those on the front lines of public health to identify and respond to serious infectious disease threats. This investment in the expansion of the life science industry once again demonstrates Governor Hochul's commitment to further protecting the public health of all New Yorkers."

Grants awarded through the Biodefense Commercialization Fund will help bring to market advanced solutions that identify, treat, and prevent serious infectious diseases, encouraging growth across New York's expanding life science industry and positioning the state as a leader in infectious disease resiliency and mitigation. Among the projects being pursued by the initial round of grantees are those focused on the development of antivirals, antibacterials, and potent vaccines; rapid detection of infectious disease threats and biologic toxins; and prevention of infection transmission on surfaces.

Eligible companies that are developing promising diagnostics, vaccines, therapeutics, and other innovations to prevent, treat or mitigate serious infectious disease threats can apply for grants of up to \$4 million. New York's academic research institutions also may apply for grants of up to \$500,000 to help fast track advanced intellectual property in life sciences. An emphasis will be placed on supporting the development of innovations with the highest potential for commercial viability. The deadline to apply is October 6, 2022 at 5 p.m. EDT. The Biodefense Commercialization Fund is managed by Empire State Development, with guidance from an

Executive Committee that includes representatives from New York State's Department of Health, Columbia University, the Mount Sinai School of Medicine, and two venture funds. A panel of experts from the biopharma industry, life science venture community, and academia review, evaluate and provide recommendations to ESD on submitted applications. An important feature of the program is that grantees receive guidance from mentors with experience in the biopharma industry, venture investing, and academia to help ensure their development programs stay on track.

NYFIRST Fourth Application Round Now Open

The fourth round of grants from the New York Fund for Innovation in Research and Scientific Talent (NYFIRST) is now open. The \$15 million medical school grant program encourages recruitment and retention of exceptional life science researchers focused on translational research, which builds on basic scientific research to find new ways to diagnose and treat medical conditions. NYFIRST offers grants of up to \$1 million.

The life science sector encompasses the fields of biotechnology, pharmaceuticals, biomedical technologies, life systems technologies, and includes organizations and institutions that devote the majority of their efforts to the various stages of research, development, technology transfer and commercialization. Every day, firms in this sector are developing new medical and pharmaceutical breakthroughs that have the potential to save lives, whether through new therapies or the early detection of diseases like cancer and neurological diseases. 



Congresswoman Tenney Cosponsors Legislation to Protect New York's Family Farms

Congresswoman Claudia Tenney announced her cosponsorship of H.R. 8756, the Protect Local Farms Act, to prevent the recent recommendation from the New York State Farm Laborers Wage Board to lower the overtime threshold from 60 hours to 40 hours per week from taking effect. Congressman Chris Jacobs (NY-27) introduced the legislation, and Congresswoman Elise Stefanik (NY-21) is also a cosponsor.

"The decision to recommend lowering the farm worker overtime threshold from 60 to 40 hours per week is woefully misguided and ignores input from important industry stakeholders," said Congresswoman Tenney. "Family farms, who are already struggling with rising costs from diesel to fertilizer and more, could be forced to reduce operations or leave the industry or state altogether. The Board completely failed to consider the overwhelming and passionate comments from farmers, consumers, and farm workers in formulating their policy priorities, deciding to undermine the very industry and workers they are supposed to serve. Today, I am honored to stand up for these very farmers. No farms, no food."

Specifically, the Protect Local Farms Act would mandate federally that the overtime threshold for the agriculture industry cannot be set lower than 60 hours per week, effectively keeping New York's current overtime threshold in place.

Congresswoman Tenney Demands DOJ Enforcement of Critical Election Integrity Law

Claudia Tenney (co-chair of the Election Integrity Caucus in Congress, sent a letter to U.S. Attorney General (AG) Merrick Garland demanding the enforcement of a critical election integrity law, the Civil Rights Act of 1960, under which the preservation of election documents and records is required. Tenney was joined

on the letter by Reps. Elise Stefanik (NY-23), Bill Posey (FL-08), Andrew Garbarino (NY-02), Michael Guest (MI-03), and Louie Gohmert (TX-01).

Earlier this week, the America First Policy Institute (AFPI) released a report titled, National Review of Retaining Election Records from the 2020 Election, which revealed that despite the records retention requirement under the Civil Rights Act, many of the most populous jurisdictions across the country are not complying with it. In fact, just six of 100 of the most heavily populated counties that were contacted by AFPI for information were able to provide their actual voter files from the 2020 election as required by law. Some counties failed to retain the records while others did not possess timestamped records dating back to the 2020 election and had likely already updated their voter files. Further, those six jurisdictions that did provide these records demonstrated an average difference between the number of voters and the number of votes cast of 2.89%. Cobb County, Georgia had a discrepancy as high as 8.8%.

"I'm astounded by the pervasive failure of states to comply with basic federal law to ensure our elections are both transparent and secure," said Congresswoman Tenney. "Americans should be able to verify that the number of people registered as voting in a given election is consistent with the number of ballots cast. Further, it's deeply troubling that the records actually provided by a small number of counties were grossly inaccurate, either because of incompetence or malfeasance. Attorney General Garland must act to hold these counties accountable for their failure to comply with record-keeping requirements in the 2020 election and act to ensure this important federal law is being enforced today. All states are now on notice, in 2022, this vital information must be preserved in accordance with the law. I'm grateful that AFPI is sounding the alarm on this critical issue."

In part, the lawmakers wrote, "The Department of Justice has a responsibility to enforce the Civil Rights Act of 1960, and we strongly urge you to begin doing so immediately. We, therefore, ask that you undertake immediate action to determine which jurisdictions nationwide may continue to be in violation of Section 301 of the Civil Rights Act of 1960 for failing to maintain documents from the 2020 election. Additionally, with the 2022 elections approaching, we also request that you act swiftly to ensure jurisdictions are complying with records requirements moving forward."

Full text of letter:

Dear Attorney General Garland:

As you may know, the Civil Rights Act of 1960 requires election officials to retain election documents and records for 22 months after a federal election. This is crucial to maintaining transparency for the American people. However, a new report from the America First Policy Institute (AFPI), titled National Review of Retaining Election Records from the 2020 Election, has shed light on the systematic failure of key jurisdictions to comply with this requirement. Congresswoman Tenney Demands DOJ Enforcement of Critical Election Integrity Law

(From Pg. 56) A majority of the most populous counties in key swing states were unable to produce documents to demonstrate their compliance with the Civil Rights Act. We therefore ask that you take immediate action to investigate non-compliance with the Civil Rights Act in the 2020 election and take all steps necessary to ensure compliance in the 2022 election and beyond.


Failing to comply with the document and record retention requirement under Section 301 of the Civil Rights Act of 1960 is a federal offense punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 or a term of imprisonment of not more than one year. Failure to comply with this law also undermines faith in our elections at a time when confidence is already at an all-time low. After all, once an election is conducted, the public and elected officials should, pursuant to law, be able to verify that the number of votes is consistent with the number of voters in each election.


Despite this, AFPI's report revealed that just six of the 100 most populous counties in important swing states are complying with this federal law, making it nearly impossible to verify whether the number of votes in the 2020 election was consistent with the number of voters in each jurisdiction. This should be a simple task for the public, elections officials, and observers alike. Unfortunately, many of our officials are failing at their most basic responsibilities. Even worse is that of the six counties that were able to demonstrate a degree of compliance with the law, the average difference between the number of ballots cast and the numbers of voters recorded as casting their ballots was as high as 8.8%, demonstrating either malfeasance or gross incompetence. This is simply unacceptable. The public deserves better, and state elections officials must work quickly to ensure the accuracy and integrity of all elections.

The Department of Justice has a responsibility to enforce the Civil Rights Act of 1960, and I strongly urge you to begin doing so immediately. We therefore ask that you undertake immediate action to determine which jurisdictions nationwide may continue to be in violation of the Section 301 of the Civil Rights Act of 1960 for failing to maintain documents from the 2020 election. Additionally, with the 2022 elections approaching, we also request that you act swiftly to ensure jurisdictions are complying with records requirements moving forward.

The great American experiment depends on faith in the democratic process and trust in our institutions. We call on you today to ensure American elections are administered in full compliance with the law. We look forward to your timely response to this concerning issue.


The Caine Mutiny

The Caine Mutiny based on the Pulizer Prize-winning 1951 novel by Herman Wouk is based upon the Wouk's own experiences. Among its themes, it deals with the moral and ethical decisions made at sea by ship captains and other officers. The mutiny of the title is legalistic, not violent, and takes place during Typhoon Cobra, in December 1944. The court-martial that results provides the dramatic climax to the plot.

Humphrey Bogart is superb as a domineering captain with brittle composure in *The Caine Mutiny*, an inquisitive courtroom drama teeming with memorable performances


Splendor in the Grass was released theatrically on October 10, 1961, by Warner Bros. Pictures to critical and commercial success, grossing \$4 million, and received two nominations at the 34th Academy Awards for Best Actress (for Wood) and Best Original Screenplay, winning the latter.

Tarzan and the Amazons is an adventure film starring Johnny Weissmuller in his ninth outing as Tarzan. Brenda Joyce plays Jane, in the first of her five appearances in the role, and Johnny Sheffield makes his sixth appearance as Boy. Henry Stephenson and Maria Ouspenskaya co-star.

The film was produced by Sol Lesser and Kurt Neumann, written by John Jacoby and Marjorie L. Pfaelzer (based on characters created by Edgar Rice Burroughs) and directed by Kurt Neumann. It was released on April 29, 1945.

Tarzan and Boy, on their way to meet Jane, who is returning from nursing work in Britain to support the war effort, rescue an "Amazon" woman from an attack by a black panther. During the attack, she drops a golden bracelet which Cheeta picks up. The Amazon woman's ankle is twisted in the incident and she cannot walk. Telling Boy to wait for him, Tarzan carries the woman back to her city of Palmyria. Boy disobeys Tarzan, follows them at a distance, and discovers the location of the city, then returns to wait for Tarzan and the adventure begins...
