

#### GOLDENROD



By Peggy DeWire As Jean and I were enjoying a cup of tea at my kitchen table, she waved her spoon at the vase of bright yellow Goldenrod saying, "That flower causes hay fever."

"Does not," I said. "Goldenrod gets blamed for hay fever because it blooms at the same time as ragweed, the real villain - Goldenrod is insect pollinated; ragweed is wind pollinated."

"Maybe so," Jean replied, holding her cup for a refill. Mmm this tea is good and different. Licorice flavored and pretty vellow

in color." "Jean, we're drinking Sweet Goldenrod tea that I made

from the leaves of the bouquet!" There are 125 species of Goldenrod (family

Solidago) all native to the U.S. and most are found in the East. While everyone recognizes the flower, you can identify them by two ways:

1. Flower shape plume, fountain, candle and flat topped.

Leaf shape with veins parallel to the mid rib or feather pattern as in most leaves. Look at the basal leaves to tell what kind you've found. Most wild flower books picture the flower and its leaf together.

Goldenrods prefer open fields but have adapted to marshes, mountains, deserts and sandy beaches.

In the East these perennials carpet acres like a yellow rug. Some fall Goldenrods grow in solid circular patches.

The tiny flower clusters bloom from July to September, ranging from rich yellow of Showy and Seaside to white of Silverrod.

Goldenrod is the state flower of Alabama, Kentucky and Nebraska.

As she got up to leave, Jean said, "I think I'll dry some leaves and make my own Sweet Goldenrod tea.' And she sniffed the yellow flowers on her way out.

#### WATER TREATMENT PLANT OPER-ATION COURSE GRADES A, B, C & D AT SUNY ULSTER (From Pg. 1)

**GRADE** A: Topics to be covered in this course include operator qualifications and responsibilities, water quality control, coagulation, sedimentation, filtration, pH and alkalinity adjustment, iron and manganese removal, water softening and chlorination, bacteriological laboratory techniques, emergency planning, safety, hydraulics and pumps, process calculations and distribution system operation and maintenance. Seventy-two hours long. Cost is \$950. Text included in course fee. Mondays & Wednesdays, September 20 - December 15.

**GRADE B:** This course of study is designed for operators of plants providing treatment for disinfection by chlorination, iron and manganese removal, corrosion control, emergency planning, safety, hydraulics and pumps, process calculations, and distribution system operation and maintenance. Forty-two hours long. Cost is \$700. Text included in course fee. Mondays & Wednesdays, September 20 - November 8.

**GRADE C:** This course of study is designed to provide the student with a basic background in the principles and practices of water treatment. It also serves as an approved course meeting the requirements set forth in Part 5 of the State

Sanitary Code for certified Water Treatment Plant Operators. Twenty-seven hours long. Cost is \$ 600. Text included in course fee. Tuesdays and Thursdays, September 28 - October 26.

**GRADE D:** This course of study is designed for operators of distribution systems serving greater than 1000 people. Topics include pressure zones, booster stations, storage tanks, fire protection and disinfection. This course is twentyone hours long. Cost is \$400. Text included in course fee. Tuesdays and Thursdays November 2 - November 23. .

#### COUNTY AWARDED \$1.260 MILLION FAA GRANT FOR GENERAL AVIATION APRON

County Manager David P Fanslau has announced that Sullivan County has been awarded a \$1.2 60,325 grant from the Federal Aviation Administration to rehabilitate the general aviation apron and two associated taxilanes at the Sullivan County International Airport located in the Town of Bethel.

"The continuing upgrade and maintenance of the County airport is critical to continued safety and operation of the airport. We thank Congressman Maurice Hinchey for his efforts in assisting Sullivan County in securing this grant," said Jonathan F. Rouis, Chairman of the Sullivan County Legislature.

This grant will provide Federal funding for the rehabilitation of the general aviation apron and two associated taxilanes at Sullivan County International Airport, located in Bethel, New York. The existing pavements are in very poor condition and require rehabilitation to enhance airport safe- Sullivan County International Airport is a general aviation airport. The Sullivan County International Airport is maintained by the Sullivan County Division of Public Works.

"The improvements associated with the rehabilitation of the general aviation apron and taxilanes will position Sullivan County for enhanced economic development opportunities, such as the arrangement with Arcadia Aviation. It is essential that the County is well positioned to adapt to the eventual economic recovery and expansion of our regional economy," said David A. Sager, Chairman of the Public Works Committee.

The airport facility improvements are typically funded by a Federal, State, and County formula of 95% Federal, 2.5% State, and 2.5% County. Therefore, it is essential that Sullivan County continues to receive Federal and State grants for the airport, in order for the airport not to become an extraordinary burden on the County's property tax levy.

#### USDA ANNOUNCES RECOVERY ACT FUNDING TO CREATE JOBS, IMPROVE HEALTH AND SANITATION IN MONTI-CELLO, NY

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced the funding of a project in New York that will improve wastewater services for the Village of Monticello, create construction jobs and support community development. The project is funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (Recovery Act)

Reinvestment Act (Recovery Act).

"This project not only will improve water quality in the community and surrounding area, it contributes to the Obama administration's continued efforts that improve the local quality of life and create opportunities for job growth," Vilsack said. "This project and others like it across the country are contributing to restoring America's economy while improving the quality of life in communities like the Village of Monticello."

The Village of Monticello has been selected to receive a \$7.9 million loan and a \$6.4 million grant for upgrades to the wastewater treatment plant, collection system, and sewer mains. Sullivan County and jurisdictions will benefit from the planning and implementation of the proposed mitigation actions included in this plan.

"The purpose of this Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan (HMP) is to effectively reduce future disaster damages, public expenditure, private losses, and community vulnerability to natural, technological, and man-made hazards. This plan provides an opportunity for Sullivan County, in conjunction with the communities included in the County, to develop a comprehensive risk assessment and to outline proposed mitigation actions that would minimize the costs and impacts of future disasters" said Fanslau.

Residents were invited to review the plan and comment on Tuesday, September 7th at the Government Center in Monticello. #### BONACIC: ELLENVILLE SENIOR HOUS-ING TO GROW AGAIN

Nearly \$9 million in New Investment in the Ellenville Area.

Plan Provides long term income to Help Ellenville Hospital and Quality Affordable Housing for Seniors

State Senator John Bonacic, a Member of the Senate Committee on Housing, Construction, and Community Development, announced today that an additional 44 units of senior housing will be built in Ellenville, adjacent to the Ellenville Regional Hospital. Rent structure will be between \$275 and \$540 per month.

The project will be funded with a mix of private funding, along with funding through the State Housing Trust Fund (\$2.4 million), along with tax credits awarded by the State, which will produce another \$5,562,750 in funding, and assistance from the Community Preservation Corporation of \$700,000.

Bonacic was on site in Ellenville on August 20, to see senior citizens start to move into Phase 2 of the housing, which is already full, and has a waiting list. Phase 3 will bring the total number of apartment units in the senior housing project to 144.

Phase 3 will complete the initial plan, laid out several years ago, by officials from Ellenville Regional Hospital, Bonacic, and the housing developer selected by the hospital, Warwick Properties Inc.

Bonacic has championed the senior housing at Ellenville hospital, not just because it provides important housing opportunities for area seniors, but also because it provides income to the Ellenville Regional Hospital, on whose property the housing is being built on.

"This is an innovative arrangement to provide revenue to the hospital, along with high quality senior housing to the Ellenville area. The Ellenville location is ideal for senior housing - it is near a grocery store and adjacent to necessary healthcare serv-

ices," Bonacic said.

Ellenville Regional Hospital President & CEO, Steve Kelley said, "Ellenville Regional Hospital is particularly thankful to Senator Bonacic for helping to secure funding for deserving seniors in our community. This initiative is a strategic component to the long term success of the hospital and helps to ensure access to affordable senior housing for residents of our community."

"Ellenville is a model for healthcare success. Healthcare in areas outside of major metropolitan areas has changed and will continue to change. That change has come in the form of affiliations, and stronger relationships with regional healthcare providers. Ellenville Regional Hospital is a model hospital for what needs to be done to save healthcare in small communities. I commend the board, the management, and most importantly the community, for taking so many steps big and small, which has made Ellenville Regional Hospital the success story it is today," Bonacic said.

According to Warwick Properties, LLC representatives, construction on the new phase of the senior housing is expected to start this October, and be completed in June of 2011.

The regional Hudson Valley Area Labor Federation, AFL-CIO has endorsed Elliott Auerbach's candidacy for re-election as Ulster County Comptroller "after careful consideration of (his) positions on key labor issues that affect working families," according to Federation President Paul Ellis-Graham.

In a letter to Auerbach, Ellis-Graham noted that the Federation "carefully follows the positions that elected officials take on key issues such as the rights of workers to organize, project labor agreements, living wages, quality education, occupational safety and health legislation and other issues that impact the lives of working men and women.'

#### COMPTROLLER SECURES COMPLI-ANCE WITH DSS CONTRACT AGENCY-Auerbach Halts Overpayments and Demands Greater Accountability

Ulster County Comptroller Elliott Auerbach interceded in a \$500,000.00 contract between the County Department of Social Services (DSS) and the non-profit organization Youth Advocate Programs, Inc. (YAP) where claims made against the County were not in compliance with the contract

governing the relationship.

"The organization, contracted to provide preventative service to children, was sending bills to DSS without supporting documentation," said Auerbach, "and they were being paid! We also found that the YAP bills were exceeding their monthly maximum

allowance for payment."

In a letter to DSS acknowledging Auerbach's recommendations, Youth Advocate Programs agreed to provide the County with "a master spreadsheet with the agreed upon budget categories and with contract spend-down data readily available." YAP further agreed to embed essential billing detail in Portable Document Files (PDF) and to document the major components of the overhead rate and indirect costs.

"This is a victory all around," said Auerbach, "bills to DSS will include detail necessary for them to determine its accuracy and taxpayers can be assured they are only paying for services rendered

and consistent with the contract.'

Auerbach has requested in his 2011 budget that two staff from the DSS Finance Office be assigned to the Comptroller's Office. "In this way we can keep those staff at DSS," explained the Comptroller,

"but have them trained by and reporting to me in compliance with Charter requirements.'

It is critical to audit claims for accuracy and compliance," said Auerbach, "which is why the Ulster County Charter requires the Comptroller to audit all claims for payment against funds for which the County is responsible, in whole or in part."

HINCHEY, COMMISSIONER DEC GRANNISS & LOCAL OFFICIALS HOLD DEDICATION CEREMONY FOR NEW CATSKILL INTERPRETIVE KIOSK-Sixteen Illustrative & Information Displays Make Their Debut at Site of Future Catskill Interpretive Center; Will Help Area Residents Learn More About the Region and Support Tourism

Congressman Maurice Hinchey (D-NY), New State Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) Commissioner Pete Grannis, and other local officials today formally unveiled and dedicated the new Catskill Interpretive Kiosk site. The kiosk is filled with 16 illustrative and informative display panels on Catskill natural history, cul-

ture, and recreational activities.

"The new Catskill Interpretive Kiosk site will provide area residents with a wide array of information about this naturally beautiful part of our state and country while also serving as a guide for visitors who may be discovering our region of the world for the very first time," Hinchey said. "I've lived in the Catskill region ever since I was a little boy and have always had a fond appreciation for these mountains and the natural settings in which we live. This kiosk and the forthcoming Catskill Interpretive Center will serve both an educational purpose while also sup-porting tourism in the region."

Located at a scenic roadside area, the kiosk offers an abundance of information for visitors to the Catskills as well as local residents. It is a microcosm of the displays planned for the Catskill Interpretive Center and a first-step toward the realization of that long-anticipated education center. Over the years, both Hinchey and the NYS DEC have shown steadfast commitment to the creation of the Catskill

Interpretive Center.

Sixteen display panels were designed, printed and mounted by NYS DEC with assistance from the partnering organizations and input from the public. The construction of the kiosk was a community endeavor, funded by private donations and public funds and supported by volunteers.

The Catskill Regional Interpretive Center is a project Hinchey initiated as part of an effort to provide an educational and tourism resource center for the Catskill State Park similar to the Adirondack Park Interpretive Centers. The Catskill Park covers over 700,000 acres and is the largest state or national park without a visitors center. Hinchey secured \$380,000 in federal funds that will be used for the design of the new center.

#### GILLIBRAND, HALL, HUDSON VALLEY VETERANS ANNOUNCE NEW PUSH TO MAKE TAX CUT FOR BUSINESSES THAT HIRE NEW VETERANS PERMA-NENT "Work Opportunity Tax Credit" for Businesses That Hire Unemployed Veterans Set to Expire End of 2010 - Estimates Show Nearly 870 Hudson Valley Vets Under 30 Currently Unemployed

With nearly 20 percent of recent Hudson Valley veterans under the age 30 looking for work, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY) today joined with Rep. John Hall (D-NY) and Hudson Valley veterans at the National Purple Heart Hall of Honor to announce a new effort to make tax credits for businesses that hire recent veterans permanent. The Work Opportunity Tax Credit that Senator Gillibrand helped establish last year encourages businesses to hire recently-returned troops from Iraq and Afghanistan in exchange for a 40 percent credit on the first \$6,000 paid to a veteran. The tax credit is set to expire at the end of this year.

Too many Hudson Valley veterans are still coming home to a very bad job market and struggle to find work," Senator Gillibrand said. "They fulfilled their duty to our country, and now it's time for us to fulfill our duty to them by making sure they have access to a good-paying job. The tax breaks we put in place are a win-win for businesses and veterans, and now we need to make them permanent so we can continue supporting businesses, create jobs, and put more of our Hudson Valley veterans to work as they come home to their families so they can suc-

ceed in the economy." The New York State Department of Labor indicates that nearly 20 percent of veterans under the age of 30 are unemployed, and more than 7 percent of all veterans across New York State are unemployed. Estimates based on this data and U.S. Census data show that nearly 9,500 Hudson Valley veterans are unemployed, with nearly 970 veterans under the age of 30 unemployed.

Jobs for Veterans, Tax Cuts for Businesses

The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act that Senator Gillibrand helped pass last year expanded the Work Opportunity Tax Credit to include new incentives for businesses to hire returning veterans, and extended them through the end of 2010.

Statewide, businesses have hired more than 500 New York veterans using the credit.

To raise awareness of the tax credit, Senator Gillibrand has been working closely with local Chambers of Commerce across New York State to encourage their member businesses use the tax credit, and hire New York veterans returning home. In return for hiring a veteran, businesses may write off 40 percent of the first \$6,000 paid to a veteran. The veteran needs to be out of the service for no more than five years.

The Defense Department would also be required to issue information about the tax credit to exiting service members, and provide documentation to demonstrate their eligibility for the credit.

To continue supporting businesses as they work to grow and create jobs, Senator Gillibrand is now working to make this tax credit permanent so all veterans will have better opportunities for a goodpaying job as they return home to their families.

Senator Gillibrand announced a full agenda last year to create jobs for recent veterans, support veteran entrepreneurs, and help homeless veterans get

back on their feet.

#### GILLIBRAND PRAISES ADDITION OF PAKISTANI TALIBAN TO U.S. TERROR LIST - Gillibrand Announced Bill to Add Pakistani Taliban to List in June with Sens. Schumer, Lautenberg, Menendez

As the Obama Administration officially adds Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan, the Pakistani Taliban group known as the TTP, to its official list of international terror organizations, U.S. Senator Kirsten Gillibrand issued the following

statement.

"America must take all steps necessary to contain and eliminate Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan. In addition to the attempted bombing in Times Square, this terrorist group has been implicated in domestic terrorism in Pakistan for years and has been repeatedly linked to al Qaeda. America's foreign policy must reflect the danger that this group poses to Americans and innocent people around the world."

In June, Senator Gillibrand joined with New York and New Jersey Senators Charles, E. Schumer, Frank Lautenberg and Bob Mendendez to announce legislation to add the TPP to America's formal list of terrorist organ-

izations.

#### HINCHEY STATEMENT ON PRESIDENT OBAMA'S OVAL OFFICE ADDRESS ON THE END OF THE COMBAT OPERA-TIONS IN IRAQ

Congressman Maurice Hinchey (D-NY) today released the following statement after President Obama's Oval Office address on the end of combat

operations in Iraq.

"Since President Obama entered office, 100,000 American troops have been removed from Iraq and after seven long years, today America's combat mission there is ending. Despite trying circumstances, our armed forces acted with courage and character. Most served multiple tours, many were injured and too many gave their lives in service to their country. We must never forget that sacrifice and we must work to honor it by continuing to support members of our military and their families.

"As we welcome these brave men and women home, however, we must also work to ensure that America never again engages in a war under false pretenses, with an unclear mission and without an exit strategy. With thousands of Americans killed along with many innocent Iraqi civilians, trillions of dollars irresponsibly spent and our international reputation badly damaged, this is a mistake our nation cannot afford to repeat.
